Q. Is the umpire allowed to reverse decision?

A. No. That is too literal a construction of the spit ball. There is no harm specially in a pitcher moistening his finger ends.

Q. Is there any rule which makes the first baseman play on his base when there is a runner on first base?

A. No. If the first baseman whates to play back in the field to watch for a hard batter he is privileged to do so even if there is a runner on first but the runner will have all the better of the start if the ball is batted.

Q. Suppose the runner steps over first base and then takes not more than two steps toward second base and then turns right back but finds the ball at first waiting for him. Would that be considered trying for second base?

A. It looks very much that way. Two steps directly toward second would indicate that the runner was going to make the base if he could.
