

Convicts Resent Order Halting Work on Roads

Prisoners Who Violated Paroles Blamed Rather Than State Board—Public Opinion Reason Given.

Lincoln, June 30.—(Special)—Discontinuation of the maintenance of convict road camps in the summer by the state upon the order of Governor S. R. McKelvie, chairman of the board of parole, admittedly has caused more resentment among convicts at the state penitentiary than anything in years.

Prison officials declared that the resentment and mutterings are directed more at Fred Brown and other convicts in the penitentiary, who have failed to make good after being paroled, than against the public opinion against the parole system, than at members of the board whose duty is to be dictated by public opinion, which, on the surface, demands a tightening in the parole system.

Public Opinion Is Reason.
Governor McKelvie admitted today the board's action is the result of adverse public opinion and hysteria concerning convicts aroused by the Fred Brown episode.

"With public opinion as it is today there would be a terrible 'blow-up,' if one of the men on the road camp would go astray," the governor said. "Then, too, we had difficulty in finding any county that wished to harbor a road camp this year because of the turmoil aroused by the Fred Brown case."

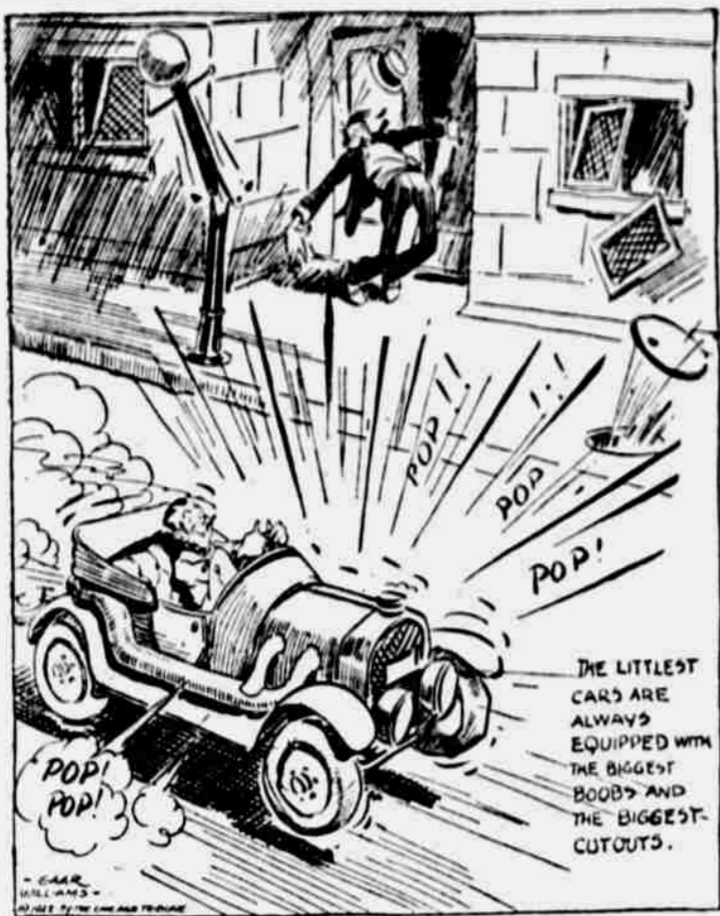
However, we did persuade the Nebraska county commissioners to permit us to put a camp there. But when I read the list of men picked by Warden W. T. Fenton and N. T. Harmon, state parole officer, I decided to call off the road camp.

Lifers on Test.
"There were numerous lifers and men convicted of statutory crimes in the list, and I felt that when that list was published the state would go wild. I do not wish to criticize those officers for selecting these men, because they must in order to maintain discipline in the institution give the men, who behave themselves, privileges. It is a well known fact that usually the men with the worst records on the outside have the best records on the inside."

"I sincerely regret that we had to put a stop to the road camp as in my opinion the fact that the state had convicts available to throw out on the road in the event contractors demanded too much for road building has forced down prices and saved Nebraska many thousands of dollars."

Lincoln, June 30.—(Special)—The bobbed-haired girl who gave her

name as Lois Caples yesterday, when arrested with two men and another girl in Cass county by State Sheriff Gus Hyers, is a runaway bride of six weeks, according to a telegram received by Hyers from the chief of police of Joplin, Mo.

The girl first said she lived at the Millard hotel in Omaha and then told the officers her home is in Joplin. Hyers wired Joplin and received a reply from the police chief, saying the girl had married Albert Hausing there just six weeks ago. She was nabbed when caught riding in an automobile, which was said to contain liquor, with Keith McLeod, Millard hotel, in Omaha, and another couple, H. E. Russell of the Millard hotel and Velma Kelly, 1519 Manderson street, Omaha.

The quartet will be taken to Plattsmouth to face liquor charges, according to Hyers.
