

Nebraska League Women Question State Candidates

Obtain Expression on Four Important Issues by Submitting Questionnaires to Office Aspirants.

Lincoln, July 15.—The Nebraska League of Women Voters made public a summary showing how candidates for the offices of secretary of state, state auditor, railway commission, commissioner of public lands and buildings, state treasurer and attorney general express themselves on four of the many questions submitted to them by the league recently.

The questions covered in today's report of the league embrace the following:

1. Stand on the Nebraska code system. 2. What plan have you for the reduction of taxation? 3. Are you in favor of direct primary? 4. Do you favor universal registration of voter in Nebraska? 5. Are you in favor of the Shepard-Towner bill?

Answers were as follows: Office of secretary of state: Six out of eight candidates answering, all parties represented. On code question: For present code, 1; for code with amendments, 3; repeal of code, 1; for survey of whole problem, 1.

Favor Tax Reduction. Tax reduction question: For more equitable distribution of taxes, 2; curtailing of expenditures, 1; reduction of number of employees, 1; reduction of salaries, 1; refused to answer, 1.

Direct primary: For direct primary, 4; for modified primary, 2. Universal registration: Against, 4; in favor, 1; to let people decide, 1. Shepard-Towner bill: For, 3; not prepared to answer, 1; evaded question, 1.

Office of state auditor: Four out of 5 answering. On code: For amended code, 1; against code, 1; declared it did not affect office, 1; refused to answer, 1.

Tax reduction: Favoring tax on gross income, 1; reduction of number of employees, 1; reduction of expenditures, 1; less expenditure, 1. All for present primary.

Universal registration: Against, 2; for, 1; unanswered, 1. Shepard-Towner bill: For, 1; against, 1; unanswered, 1; evaded, 1.

Commissioner public lands and buildings. Three out of four answering. Code: For amended code, 2; unanswered, 1.

Tax reduction: For reduced activity, 1; for economy in expenditures, 1; unanswered, 1. Primary: For, 1; for improved primary, 1; one blank. Universal registration: Against, 2; one blank. Shepard-Towner bill: In favor, 1; evasive, 1; one blank.

State treasurer, seven out of ten answering. Code: For, 1; against, 3; undecided, 1; for change, 1; one blank.

Tax reduction: For economy, 1; for reduction cost of government, 1; for increased service, 1; more equitable distribution of tax, 1; no plan, 1; reduction of local budget, 1; blank, 1. Primary: For, 6; blank, 1. Universal registration: Against, 4; for, 2; blank, 1. Shepard-Towner bill: For, 4; undecided, 1; unprepared, 1; blank, 1.

Attorney general, five out of eight answering. Code: For, 1; for amended, 3; for change, 1. Tax reduction: For business administration, 2; for more wise expenditure, 1; for more equal distribution, 1; to cut out waste, 1. Primary: For, 4; for amended, 1. Universal registration: For, 2; against, 1; for, in cities of the first class, 1; for, in cities but not in rural districts, 1; for modified, 1. Shepard-Towner bill: For, 3; blank, 1; for principal but opposed to 50-50 part, 1.

Railway commission, six out of eight answering. Code: For, 2; for amended, 2; for repeal, 2. Tax reduction: For reduction building activities, 1. Primary: All six in favor of universal registration: Against, 3; for, 1; for, in cities, 2. Shepard-Towner Bill: In favor of, 4; unprepared to answer, 1; blank, 1.

Brother of Nebraska Man Loses All Under Bolshevics Friend, Neb., July 14.—(Special.)—Henry Schaechtle of this city received a letter from his brother who resides in Russia, Thursday, which bore stamps to the amount of 390,000 rubles. His brother writes that in 1914 he was the owner of considerable land, two threshing outfits, one corn-shelling outfit and a patent right on a self-feeder for a threshing rig, for English threshing machines which had been adopted by the Russian government. At that time his factory was turning out four apparatuses per week. He served all through the war and was not wounded, but under the bolshevik government in Russia he lost everything and was compelled to beg for bread.

Homestead Restored to Soldier Through Legion Lead, S. D., July 14.—(Special.)—Through the efforts of Homestake post of the American Legion of this city a valuable homestead was saved to Ralph Kiggins, a member of the post. Some time ago he filed on a homestead near Alzada, Mont.

It was held by the federal land officers that he had failed to live up to the requirements of the law by making his residence on the homestead, and the land office moved to dispossess him. The matter was taken up by the executive committee of the local American Legion post, with the result that the ruling was set aside and Kiggins restored to his rights. He will now make final proof on the land.

Lightning Causes Damage to Greenfield Property Greenfield, Ia., July 14.—(Special.)—Lightning has done considerable damage in and near this place. A large maple tree standing near the public square was struck by a bolt of lightning, while a large barn and an outbuilding on the John Burrell farm were struck and damaged to some extent. Two calves owned by Paul Christensen were killed.

Auburn Property Shrink Much in Taxable Value

Auburn, Neb., July 14.—(Special.)—There has been a decided shrinkage of the value of all taxable property in Nemaha county, according to the figures shown by the recapitulation of the returns made by assess-

ors. In real estate, the valuation for 1922 is \$145,885 less than in 1921. This is due to the fact that the land was revalued this year. But the greatest shortage is apparent in personal property, amounting to \$1,562,105, due to the fact that much property is exempt from taxation, the \$200 exemption on household goods running into thousands of dollars.
