It was perhaps a somewhat belated realization of the influence which the two strikes are having on industrial affairs which induced the turning of paper profits into actual cash assets. Heretofore the market has ignored the relation between industry and the strikes, but this overlooking of events was based upon the theory that neither one of the difficulties would extend over a considerable period. Now the two strikes are beginning to have something of an interlocking nature, since the railroads themselves have not any too great supply of coal on hand.
