Geneva, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—Successful candidates in the primary for county offices were as follows:

Republican—County treasurer, Clay Thomas; sheriff, John E. Little; attorney, George D. Mathewson.

Democratic—County clerk, William H. Siler; sheriff, Nick Marson; attorney, Thomas J. Keenan.

Nonpolitical—Superintendent of schools, Margaret E. Haughawout and Elizabeth Schelkopf.

Candidates for state representative of the Fifty-fourth district are: Republican, Richard A. Matteson (opposed); democratic, George Landgren. The latter won over his opponent, J. P. Davis, by only five votes. A dozen ballots to be returned by mail may change the outcome.

For state senator of the Seventeenth district, the republican candidate will be W. A. Sellers and the democratic Charles Smith.

Grand Island, Neb., July 22.—(Special Telegram.)—Three cases of what is evidently amateur burglary were reported to police Saturday morning. The offices of Mayor & Kroger, lawyers Allan & Wilkinson, real estate, and the Dolan Fruit company, wholesalers were visited. Some loot may have been obtained at the first named, Mr. Mayor being absent and definite knowledge not being obtained at once, but no money was obtained at the real estate office. At the wholesale house 20,000 cigarettes and some smoking tobacco are missing.

Quiet Reigns at Fairbury Among Railroad Strikers

Fairbury, July 22.—(Special.)—All is quiet among Rock Island strikers at Fairbury. New men have not been employed.

New recruits are promised and expected daily and for their protection when they arrive, 35 peace officers have been deputized.

One-fifth of the strikers have been retained for picket duty and the others have been released to seek other employment pending strike settlement.

Nebraskan Held in Iowa on Charge of Nonsupport

Bedford, Ia., July 22.—(Special.)—Harley Davidson, wanted in Nuckolls county, Nebraska, is being held here pending the arrival of the Nebraska sheriff who holds a warrant for Davidson charging him with nonsupport of his children by his first wife from whom he was divorced. Davidson and his second wife were in this vicinity selling oils. He has agreed to return to Nebraska without requisition papers.

Governor Sanctions Act of Citizens at Fremont

Lincoln, July 22.—(Special.)—Governor McKelvie stated today that the prompt and efficient action taken by Fremont officials in quelling possible bloodshed and rioting at the trial of strikers accused of kidnapping men desiring to work, had received sanction of state officials. Riot guns used by civilian police had been obtained by Sheriff Quinton of Fremont several days in advance from the adjutant general's office.

Man Wounded in Booze Car Is Expected to Recover

Grand Island, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—No further developments have taken place in the cases of men held since Wednesday morning in connection with the illicit beer transportation cases. Carson, the wounded man, is improving and his recovery is expected. Federal and state officers have left for Omaha temporarily.

Boy Scouts in Camp

McCook, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—Forty McCook Boy Scouts have been encamped at Lake Champion, near Imperial, Chase county, the last week, financed by the Boy Scout board and the Rotary club of McCook. They will break camp Monday.

Legislator Who Fought McKelvie Is Defeated

Lincoln, July 22.—(Special Telegram.)—E. F. Gifford of Pawnee, who with Charles Epperson of Clay, and Albert H. Byrum of Bloomington, defeated candidate for nomination for governor, fought everything Governor McKelvie advocated in the legislature, was defeated in the primaries in his home county by W. T. Parkinson, according to word received here. Gifford, in published letters, declared that his fight was on McKelvie's issues. Parkinson, the republican nominee for the lower house, defeated Gifford by 200 votes. Epperson did not attempt to get the nomination.

New Bank to Take Place of Closed One at Spencer

Lincoln, July 22.—(Special.)—J. E. Hart, secretary trade and commerce, is in receipt of an application for a new bank at Spencer, to be known as the Spencer State bank. The officers proposed are: Emil Faldia, president; Fred Jelinek, vice president; James Zoubek, cashier. This bank is to take the place of the First National bank at Spencer, which was closed July 15, 1922.

Defeat of Irish Rebels Certain

National Army Forces Prove Superior in Battles in the South.

Dublin, July 22.—A general defeat for the irregulars in south Ireland is regarded now as certain in army quarters here. In numbers and fighting equipment they are declared to have proved inferior to the national army forces, whose competently handled artillery has been able to dislodge the insurgents from any position they occupied.
