

Fleaharty Loses to McDonald for Attorney General

Omaha Democrat Beaten. Unofficial Returns Show—Dorsey Also Defeated—Official Count May Be Needed.

Related returns on the race for democratic nomination for attorney general gave Kenneth McDonald of Bridgeport 16,992, and Harry Fleaharty of Omaha 16,566, with 1,277 of the state's 1,913 precincts reported, strengthening the belief by politicians that only the official vote would decide which of the two is the winner.

A total of 1,734 precincts gave O. S. Spillman of Pierre, who led the field of candidates for the republican nomination for attorney general, 30,379, as compared to 28,845 for William C. Dorsey of Lincoln, his closest contestant.

A. R. Humphrey of Broken Bow, with a lead of more than 2,000 votes over his nearest competitor, A. J. Scattered of Amesworth, apparently was assured of the short republican congressional nomination in the Sixth district to oppose Charles W. Beal of Broken Bow, the democratic nominee, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Rep. Moses P. Kin-kaid.

Revised returns from the race between Charles H. Randall of Randolph and Adam McMullen from 1902 precincts gave Randall 49,336 and McMullen 48,948, a lead of 386 for Mr. Randall.

The mailed vote under the absent voters law is not included in the foregoing list of counties, with the exception of Douglas, and whether the mail vote is large enough one way or the other to bring about a radical change in the standing is a matter of conjecture.

Result Still in Balance. Inasmuch as it probably will be a week before the official count is completed in Douglas and some of the larger counties of the state, it is likely the result will not be known before that time, and even then, politicians think, there is a possibility that only the final check by the secretary of state at Lincoln will definitely decide the winner.

Primary ballots cast by absentee voters of Douglas county were totaled Saturday, but did not materially affect the standing of any candidate, W. D. McHugh, election commissioner, announced. The commission immediately turned its attention to canvassing the complete vote of Douglas county and, preparing to work nights and Sundays, too, expects to finish the task within seven days.

Cattle Receipts Show Increase at Stockyards Here

Five-Day Record Shows Gain of 1,255 Head Over Similar Period During Previous Week.

During the last week there has been an increase of stocker and feeder cattle receipts at the local stockyards, according to figures given out by Secretary A. F. Stricker of the Livestock exchange.

For the first five days of the week 4,250 head of feeder cattle were sent out as against 3,011 head the same period the previous week, and 2,047 head for the same days last year.

According to predictions of commission men there will be an increased movement of stocker and feeder cattle as the summer season advances. Feeder sheep and lambs also exhibited a large increase with a showing of 18,955 head for the first five days of the week as against 11,395 for the same days of the week before and the same week a year ago there were only 9,088 head sent out.

Steam Heat Users Granted Temporary Injunction. Geneva, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—A temporary injunction has been granted users of steam heat from the electric light plant here against the Public Service company which is controlled by the Continental Gas & Electric company. The injunction will prevent continuance of work on transmission lines being built in Geneva, until after the hearing before Judge Ralph Brown at Crete, July 25.

The action of the patrons of the plant was taken after an announcement by the Public Service company that no heat would be supplied this winter.

Fire Damages Home. Beatrice, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—The home of Theodore Skladany, South Third street, was damaged to the extent of \$500 by fire which started in the roof, supposedly from sparks from a passing Burlington locomotive. The fire was burned away before the firemen extinguished the flames.

Wheat Makes 40 Bushels. Beatrice, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—John Doolittle, living near Fifth, threshed his wheat this week and received a yield of 40 bushels to the acre. This is the heaviest yield reported in Gage county this season.

Candidate Has 2-Vote Lead Over Opponent

West Point, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—Casimir Zarek is only two votes ahead of his opponent, Robert R. Mosdick, in the democratic race for county attorney. The mail vote and perhaps a recount may be necessary to determine the winner. J. C. Elliott was the only candidate for the republican nomination.

Fred Wackel was nominated on the republican ticket for county treasurer; George Dewald, democrat, and K. Kollmorgen, progressive. For sheriff, William Clausen, republican Arthur G. Sexton, democrat. Neither candidate for county clerk, R. Braza, democrat, and Ben Gramky, republican, had any opposition. Martin Byssog, republican, and Soren Nelson, democrat, was nominated county assessor. For state senator of this district Henry Behrens carried Cuming county on the republican ticket, and A. R. Olson the democrat.

Ice Price Increased to \$1 Per Hundred at Fullerton. Fullerton, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—The Nebraska Gas and Electric company, operating the light and ice plant here, has increased the price of ice from 70 cents per 100 pounds to \$1. The firm gives as the reason the fact that it has to pay the city such a high rate for water. Towns around here are selling ice delivered at 50 cents per 100 pounds. A deal is being made whereby ice can be delivered here to consumers for 70 cents by trucking it from a nearby town.

Garage, Machine Shed, Barn and Two Cars Burn on Farm. Parker, S. D., July 22.—(Special.)—The E. E. Costain farm, two and one-half miles east of Parker, was the scene of one of the most disastrous farm fires in South Dakota this summer. A garage, machine shed and a stock barn, two auto-cars and all of the farm machinery, hay, grain and tools were burned. Two hounds and eight puppies were burned to death. The loss is estimated at over \$5,000 with partial insurance.

Kroh Named State Senator. Ogallala, Neb., July 22.—(Special.)—J. S. Kroh of Ogallala was nominated state senator from the Thirty-first district. His plurality was 300 over Johnson of Potter, and Bushee of Kimball.
