Dainty Preserves From the Flower Garden. Go to your flower beds when you

are thinking of next winter's store of preserves. To be sure, there is not much that they yield, but there are some things too good to miss out on.

For one thing, there are nasturtium seeds. These are quite as good as capers if they are properly bottled. And that only means that they must be picked when they are big, but still green, washed carefully, covered with hoiling vinegar, and the vinegar with boiling vinegar, and the vinegar brought again to the boling point, and then carefully bottled.

And then there are the rose beds. You can candy the rose petals to make a delicious confection or a charming decoration for cakes. To do this, cook the syrup of sugar and water to the sugar stage and then very carefully dip in the rose petals, which have been carefully washed and spread to dry in a cool, shady place. Let them cool on a marble slab or a big platter, and when they are cool and sugared put them away

between layers of waxed paper. There are other things to do with rose petals. Here are some of them: Rose Flavoring. The easiest way to prepare this is to fill a bottle with fresh, fragrant
