

Water Plant to Use Oil if Coal Shortage Looms

Change to Liquid Fuel Can Be Made in Three Days' Time at Minne Lusa Station.

The engineering department of the Metropolitan Utilities district has arranged to convert the Minne Lusa water plant at Florence into an oil-burning station should the exigencies of the coal situation necessitate this action. The change could be made in three days.

The present supply of coal at the Florence plant is sufficient for two and one-half months. It is the policy of the department under ordinary conditions not to allow this supply to get below a 60-day quantity. The average daily coal consumption is 100 tons during the summer months. Last week 15 cars of lignite coal were received from Colorado at a price of \$6.07 1/2 per ton. Thirty more cars are in transit from the same coal field. Railroads in Kansas City yesterday morning paid \$8.97 per ton for Cherokee slack.

W. J. Barber, purchasing agent for the Metropolitan Utilities district, explained that fuel oil can be used at the Florence plant at a price comparable with the Colorado coal now being received. Plenty of fuel oil can be obtained at a price of \$1.74 per barrel delivered in Omaha. About three and one-half barrels of oil equal one ton of steam coal in operating efficiency.

When the water plant's coal bin at Florence cannot be maintained with a 75-day supply, the oil burners will be installed. The plant engineers state they are preparing for a contingency.

The municipal gas plant now has a supply of coal, gas oil and coke to last three months and there has been no appreciable reduction in the receipt of supplies during the last few weeks.

Michael Stagno, who is conducting a novena of prayer to St. Anne, patroness of the church, for the miraculous cure of those suffering from physical ailments. At her knock on the door, the young priest met her. "Can't I be cured?" "Is this where crippled persons can be cured?" the forlorn figure asked. Father Stagno explained the value of steady prayer and worship to St. Anne to which hundreds of former sufferers have attributed their cures. He told her of faith and self-denial and thoughtful meditation. "Well, Father, can't I be cured?" the woman queried, wondering. "Perhaps, my good woman," replied the priest. And he gave her a small booklet telling of the graces of St. Anne and how to intercede through her position in heaven. He bade her enter the little church and offer a prayer before the altar of the saint. The woman left the house hopeful and smiling. She trudged her way to the church and straight to the altar railing where, before the statue
