

Official Count of Primary Vote Here Completed

Only Surprise of Official Returns Is Nomination of Pat Casey Over Adam Sloup.

The official canvass of the Douglas county primary vote revealed one surprise, which was the democratic nomination of Pat Casey in the second county commissioner district. He defeated Adam Sloup by two votes. The unofficial returns gave the nomination to Sloup. The vote was: Sloup, 718; Casey, 720. Casey will oppose C. H. Kubat for the election.

Election Commissioner W. D. McHugh, jr., will have complete lists of precinct committeemen and women and delegates to county conventions ready Monday morning.

The official canvass of the Douglas county primary vote showed that 28,303 votes were cast as follows: Republican, 16,034; democratic, 11,649; progressive, 607; prohibition, 13.

Jail, \$1,000 Fine for Assailant of Rail Worker

Federal Judge Warns That "Light Sentence" Not to Be Repeated for Other Injunction Violators.

In sentencing John Madden, 20, 707 High street, Council Bluffs, to 60 days in jail and \$1,000 fine on execution yesterday for violation of the federal restraining order against strikers, Federal Judge Martin Wade forcefully stated that "such a light sentence is not to be taken as a sample for further similar cases that might come up before him."

Light murmurings swept over the crowd that filled the court room. Madden was the first striker to be sentenced under the federal restraining order against unlawful picketing or interference with workers in Council Bluffs. Testimony at the trial showed that on July 14 Madden entered the Milwaukee roundhouse and threatened Morton Rooney, 67, a stationary engineer who had remained on duty. Madden was arrested at that time, but released on insufficient evidence.

Further testimony indicated that on July 26 he accosted Rooney at Seventeenth avenue and High street, striking the aged man behind the ear and rendering him unconscious. A Milwaukee railroad special agent testified that after Madden struck Rooney, he rolled the body on a lawn and fastened away.

When Madden's attorney moved the dismissal of the case on the grounds that Madden had been in the employ of a private firm and therefore was not ruled by the federal restraining order, Judge Wade scored the barstier.

The case was not appealed.

Pawnee City Wheat Field Yields 40 Bushels an Acre

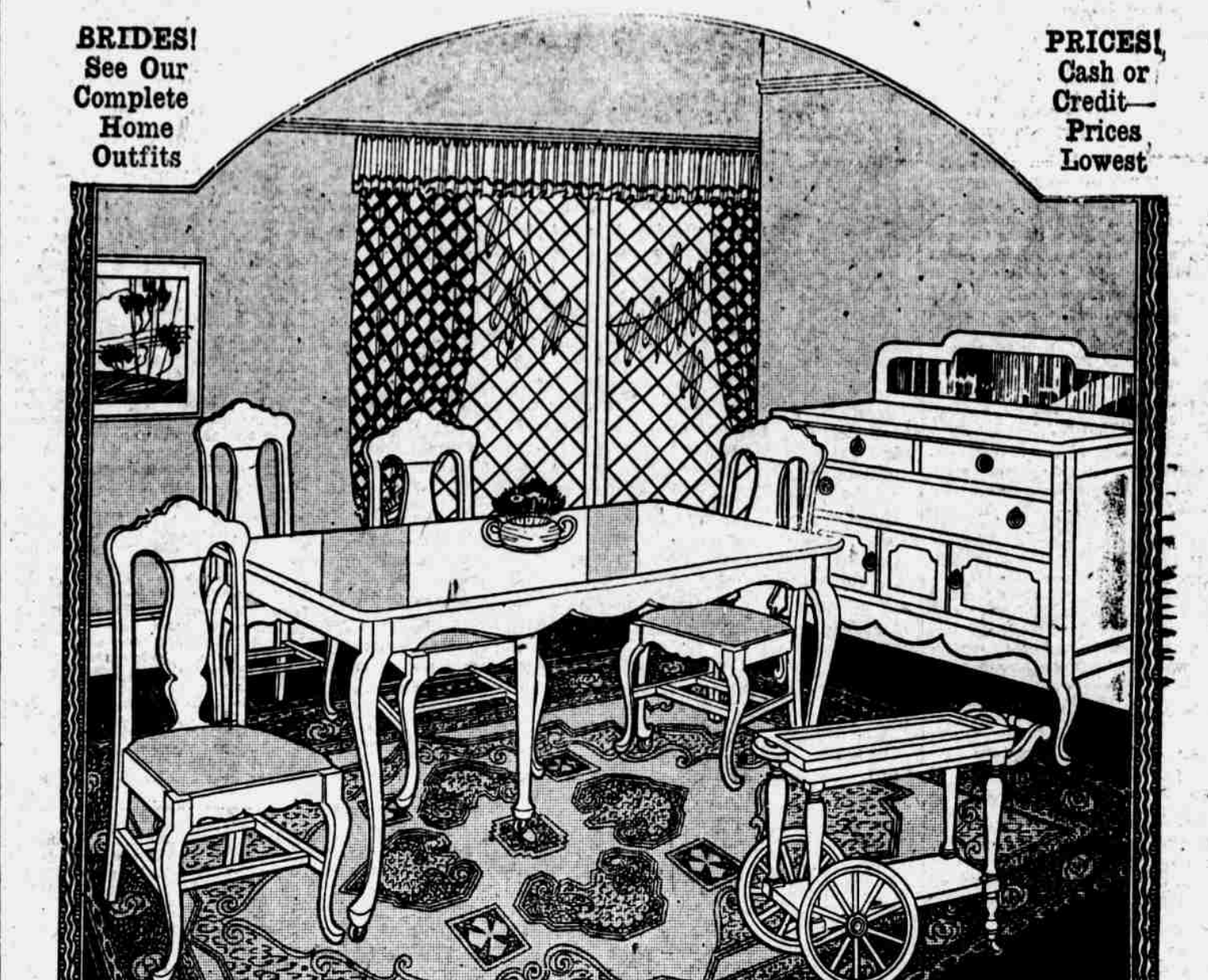
