Light murmurings swept over the crowd that filled the court room. Madden was the first striker to be sentenced under the federal restraining order against unlawful picketing or interference with workers in Council Bluffs. Testimony at the trial showed that on July 14 Madden entered the Milwaukee roundhouse and threatened Morton Rooney, 67, a stationary engineer who had re-mained on duty. Madden was an-rested at that time, but released on insufficient evidence.

Further testimony indicated that on July 26 he accested Rooney at Seventeenth avenue and High street, striking the aged man behind the A Milwaukee railroad special agent testified that after Madden struck Rooney, he rolled the body on a lawn and hastened away.
When Madden's attorney moved the






