Golf Facts

Q.-Is there any penalty where a player in a qualifying round drives from outside the teeing ground, then in preparing to drive another ball, touches it and knocks it off the tee? A.-There is no penalty stisched, but the player is considered to have played two strokes. The stroke played from out of bounds counts a stroke hall to move, thereafter, also counts a stroke. O - to the any provision in the rules

move, inercatter, also counts a stroke. Q.—Is there any provision in the rules that a player loses the hole, if his cad-dis follows him into a hazard from which he is going to play his ball? A—No.

A.-No. Q-In a recent handicap tournament at our club, two players in one match fin-ished all even. One player allowed the other one stroke on the round. This stroke happened to fall according to the card at the 15th hole. The two players wanted to play off the fis at \$ holes, and the committee allowed them to do so, playing the first \$. Was that permissi-ble?

ble? A.—The ordinary procedure calls for another 18 holes or if both players are willing, they may play 9 holes, provided the number of strokes given are equally prorated over both 9a. However, if the players in this case agreed as stated, there seems no good grounds on which any others could object.

Q.-What is the penalty for putting before your opponent's ball has stopped? A.-A loss of the hole in match play and two strokes in medal.

Q.-In a case where my ball is on the putting surface, say 30 feet from the hole and my opponent's is in a trap at the edge of the green something like 20 feet away, is he considered away, because he is not on the green, or am I away? A.-You are away.




