Marks New Era in Athletics.

Creation of the office marks a new era in intercollegiate athletics and plainly shows the middlewest is setting the pace in its efforts to establish clean athletics. Ever since the western conference was organized associations formed in other parts of the country have copied its rules. The Missouri Valley conference follows the rules of the Big Ten very closely, as do the Rocky Mountain and Pacific coast conferences.

Following the wholesale housecleaning after the football season last year, institutions in most every minent eastern university investigated their athletes, with the result several were eliminated from further intercollegiate competition. The plan of the commissioner will be watched closely by associations in all parts of the country. If it has desired re-sults it is only reasonable to assume like offices will be created in the other conference bodies.
