Attempt Made to Fix Definite Day For Vote on Bonus

Doubt Is Expressed as to Result of Move to Name Date for Action on Bill in the Senate.

Washington, Aug. 16.—Negotiations to fix a day for a senate vote on the soldiers' bonus bill were in progress between republican and democratic leaders, but with considerable doubt, it was said, regarding a successful outcome. Many senators were said to have expressed a desire for a brief rest after disposing of the tariff bill next Saturday before proceeding with the bonus measure, which is to come up automatically under an agreement made several weeks ago. Under consideration, it was said, was the negotiation of an agreement for a recess of the senate next week, but after consent had been given fixing a definite date for a final vote on the bonus measure. There was said to be considerable objection to the recess proposal and also to fixing a date for a bonus bill vote. Several senators were said to be anxious to take up other bills on the calendar, while others desired to have the senate continue work until an adjournment sine die could be effected and all members released definitely for the election campaigns.
