

# Dave Danforth Loses to "Lefty" Hyman in Pitching Duel at Buffalo Park

## Former Brown Hurler Trimmed by Herd, 7 to 4

### Two Double Steals for Home Big Help to Omaha's Scoring Department—Two Games Today.

DAVE DANFORTH, alleged to be the American league's leading most-weathered hurler, made his debut in a Tulsa uniform at Buffalo park yesterday afternoon and was beaten, 4 to 7, in a pitching duel with "Lefty" Hyman, Burch's latest addition to the Omaha hurling staff.

## U. S. Runs on \$157,000,000 Less in July Than in '21

The total expenditures charged against ordinary receipts amounted to \$2,228,000,000 during July, against \$2,385,000,000 in the same month last year.

## "Reb" Russell Stages Successful "Comeback" in Major Leagues

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 19.—Purchase of Elwell A. (Reb) Russell by the Pittsburgh National league club from the Minneapolis American association team recalls the interesting baseball career of the slugging Minn. outfielder, who in 10 years rose to a major league star as a pitcher, pitched a world's series then, after a reversal of form, became one of the hardest hitting players in the American association.

His major league days date from 1912 until 1919, when he was with the Chicago Americans, and for a time the White Sox's leading pitcher. In his first year with the Sox he won 22 games, losing but 16. The height of his career came in 1917, when he pitched in the world's series between the White Sox and the New York Giants.

Started in Texas. His ball playing began at Benham, in northern Texas, in that year. He finished a sensational year with the Fort Worth club and was purchased by Charles Comiskey, owner of the Chicago team. The erstwhile southpaw pitching luminary was 23 years old then.
