

Missouri Synod Will Celebrate Diamond Jubilee

Big Meeting in City Auditorium Tomorrow Afternoon—Sacred Concert in Evening.

Omaha Lutherans will join with all Lutheran congregations of the Missouri synod in Nebraska and Wyoming and their representatives assembled for the annual convention of the Nebraska district here to celebrate the diamond jubilee of the Missouri synod in a great Lutheran service at the city auditorium tomorrow at 3 p. m. Prof. J. H. C. Fritz of St. Louis and Pastor F. Brand also of St. Louis will be the principal speakers. Prof. Fritz is dean of the Lutheran Concordia seminary, St. Louis, Mo. One hundred and six graduates left the seminary in June of this year to enter the ministry of the Lutheran church, the largest known graduating class of theological students of the year.

Pastor Brand is first general vice president of the Evangelical Lutheran synod of Missouri, Ohio, and other states, one of the largest Lutheran church bodies of America, numbering according to the latest census, 1,023,948 members gathered in 3,341 congregations and served by 2,450 pastors. He is also inspector of foreign missions of the synod and has just recently completed an inspection tour around the world, visiting Lutheran missions in China, India, and in Europe.

Sacred Concert.
At 6:30 p. m. the sermon of Prof. Fritz will be broadcast from the radio station at the Omaha Grain exchange, and at 8 p. m. a Lutheran sacred concert will be given by the associated Lutheran choirs of Omaha, the Lutheran teachers choir of Nebraska, and Miss Margaret Link of Seward, Neb., soprano, at the auditorium directed by Prof. Theo Aufenberger of Omaha and Prof. K. Haase of Seward, Neb., professor of music at the Lutheran Normal school of Seward and musical director of the Lutheran teachers choir.

The Nebraska district of this synod, now in session in Omaha, was organized 40 years ago at Hooper, Neb., by 17 pastors and 16 congregations. At the present time it numbers 182 pastors, 234 congregations, and over 50,000 members. Five flourishing congregations with over 2,000 members are affiliated with this synod in Omaha.

The present general officers of the Missouri synod are: Rev. F. Photenhauer, D. D., of Chicago, Ill., president; Rev. F. Brand of St. Louis, Mo., first vice president; Rev. J. W. Miller of Ft. Wayne, Ind., second vice president; Rev. G. A. Bernthal of San Francisco, Cal., third vice president; and Rev. H. P. Eckhardt of Pittsburgh, Pa., fourth vice president; Rev. M. E. Kretzmann of Kenedelville, Ind., secretary; and E. Seigel of St. Louis Mo., treasurer.

Unsettled Weather and Showers Forecast for Week

Polish Army Increased Due to Russian Danger
Warsaw, Aug. 19.—(By A. P.)—Poland army, which normally numbers 250,000 troops, is being increased to 300,000, due to the presence of Russian forces on the Polish frontier. The strength of the soviet divisions, it is reported, has been increased from 10,000 to 30,000.

Reports also have been received here that Moscow has been making attempts to obtain military supplies and explosives in the United States, but without success. It is believed by Polish military authorities that the soviet government is also attempting to obtain supplies from Czechoslovakian plants.

Los Angeles Train Loses Identity on Chicago Run
The west bound Los Angeles Limited, No. 7, has been consolidated with Overland Limited, No. 1, on the Northwestern line between Chicago and Omaha.

No reason for the consolidation was advanced at the local Northwestern office. It was explained, however, that it is purely a temporary move.

The Union Pacific will take the consolidated trains on west to their destination as separate trains, No. 7 to Los Angeles and No. 1 to San Francisco, its local passenger officials said.

Personal Legal Adviser of Secretary Mellon Dies
Pittsburgh, Aug. 19.—James H. Beale, personal legal adviser of Secretary Mellon, was found dead in a bathroom at the residence of F. R. Babcock yesterday. Mr. Beale, who has been in Washington for some time, returned on business and was staying at the Babcock home, his residence being closed for the summer. He was a member of the firm of Reed, Smith, Shaw & Beale, of which Maj. David A. Reed also was a member before his appointment to the United States senate this week.

Mr. Tate filed no contest and no alimony was ordered, although Mrs. Tate in her petition said her husband owned their home at 4810 California street, was worth \$10,000 and earned a large salary at his position in the bank.

Following the divorce Mrs. Tate worked in a downtown office as a stenographer. The remarriage came as a surprise to friends as Mr. and Mrs. Tate made no announcement of their plans.
