Missouri Synod Will Celebrate Diamond Jubilee

Big Meeting in City Auditorium Tomorrow Afternoon-Sacred Concert in Evening.

Omaha Lutherans will join with all Lutheran congregations of the Missouri synod in eNbraska and Wyoming and their representatives assembled for the annual convention of the Nebraska district here to celebrate the diamond jubilee Missouri synod in a great Lutheran service at the city auditorium to-morrow at 3 p. m. Prot. J. H. C. Fritz of St. Louis and Pastor Fr. Brand also of St. Louis will be the principal speakers. Prof. Fritz is dean of the Lutheran Concordia seminary, St. Louis, Mo. One hun-dred and six graduates left the semidred and six graduates left the seminary in June of this year to enter the ministry of the Lutheran church,

the largest known graduating class of theological students of the year. Pastor Brand is first general vice president of the Evangelical Lutheran synod of Missouri, Ohio, and other states, one of the largest Lutheran church hodies of America, numbering according to the latest census, 1,023, 948 members gathered in 3,341 congregations and served by 2,450 pas-tors. He is also inspector of foreign missions of the synod and has just recently completed an inspection tour around the world, visiting Luth-eran missions in China, India, and in

At 6:30 p. m. the sermon of Prof. Fritz will be broadcast from the radio station at the Omaha Grain exchange, and at 8 p. m. a Lutheran sacred concert will be given by the ssociated Lutheran choirs of Omaha. the Lutheran teachers choir of Ne-braska, and Miss Margaret Link of seward, Neb., soprano, at the Au-ditorium directed by Prof Theo Aufdemberge of Omaha and Prof K Hause of Seward, Neb., professor of music at the Lutheran Normal school of Seward and musical director of the Lutheran teachers choir.

The Nebraska di rict of this synod, now in session in Omaha, was organized 40 years ago at Hoopgregations. At the present time it numbers 182 pastors, 234 congregations, and over 50,000 members. Five flourishing congregations with over 2,000 members are affiliated with this
