

Heavy Firing Lasts All Night in City of Dublin

Free State Troops on Patrol Fire on Snipers and Machine Gunners Who Attack Posts.

Dublin, Aug. 19.—(By A. P.)—Military authorities today warned citizens to remain indoors this evening, as there is reason to believe that the republicans contemplate attacks in certain places in Dublin city and county.

Dublin, Aug. 19.—(By A. P.)—There was heavy firing all last night throughout the city of Dublin between national army forces and republican irregulars. Free state troops on patrol fired at snipers and machine gunners, who attacked national army posts in various parts of the city. The plans of the irregulars, however, were frustrated by the vigilance of the national troops, it was stated today.

Fighting at Dungooley. Belfast, Aug. 19.—(By A. P.)—A spirited fight of four hours' duration occurred early today between national troops and republican irregulars at Dungooley, on the Lough-Argilly borders. The republicans finally fled across the borders, and the free state forces in pursuit. No details of casualties were reported up to this afternoon.

Nationals Advance.

Dublin, Aug. 19.—(By A. P.)—The national forces are advancing on the irregulars from both the north and south in County Cork and an official bulletin announced the capture of Macroom, one of the more important centers in the western part of the county. Millstreet, the last post under the Macroom command, was taken yesterday.

A fierce fight for Killybeg, near Mitchelstown, resulted in a victory for the nationals, who took 27 prisoners and a large quantity of arms and ammunition.

Two Red Cross workers attached to the national army have been killed in the Killybeg district, according to a report from Tralee. They were viewing the picturesque scenery from a small boat on Lough Leane and were fired on as they were disembarking on Inishfallen island.

Rathmore Captured.

The capture by the free state forces of Rathmore, County Kerry, and Newmarket and Kanturk, County Cork, is confirmed in an official communication issued by general headquarters of the national forces. The wireless station at Cliden is again working.

The barracks in Dundalk were blown up by mines which the free state troops did not discover when they entered. All the officers were put out of action, many of them being buried under the debris.

Woman Killed in Auto Crash.

Los Angeles, Aug. 19.—Mrs. James McCahill of Lake City, Minn. mother of Mrs. Franklin K. Lane, jr., was killed in an automobile accident in Germany Tuesday, according to word received by her daughter here. No details were given except that other members of the party were safe.

Wealthy Detroit Man Suspected in \$2,400,000 Robbery

Arrest Expected Today in Connection With New York Truck Holdup Last October.

Omaha Bee Leased Wire. New York, Aug. 19.—Secret service agents expect to arrest a wealthy Detroit man Saturday in connection with the \$2,400,000 mail robbery here October 24 it was learned last night. This man, reported to have had dealings with the robbers in their efforts to dispose of their loot, consisting of liberty bonds and other negotiable paper, will be brought to New York. If he turns state's evidence, as has one member of the robbery band, he may escape punishment, it was said.

The Detroit man's testimony at the trial of Gerald Chapman, George Anderson and Charles Loerber, held as three principals in the robbery, is expected to smash the alibi which counsel for Chapman and Anderson offered. Loerber turned state's evidence on Wednesday, charging that Chapman and Anderson hatched and engineered the plot to steal the bonds.

The defense conceded Chapman and Anderson had attempted to dispose of the stolen securities, but claimed neither had anything to do with the actual holdup. They were victims of circumstances, it was said. The jury was shown \$200,000 in bonds and three revolvers, one equipped with a Maxim silencer, which postal agents seized in a house last month when Anderson and Chapman lived there under aliases.

Loree Sends Peppy Answer to Pepper

New York, Aug. 19.—President L. F. Loree of the Delaware & Hudson railroad answered Senator Pepper of Pennsylvania, who charged Mr. Loree had been dealing with the rail strike by substituting "anger for judgment."

"I cannot accept it that a plain statement of fact or of concern for the interests of employes may properly be criticized as a display of anger," wrote Loree. "There are nearly 250,000 men on the payroll of the railroad in their mechanical departments. They came into the service in the faith of the resolution of the labor board of July 3, assuring them they were entitled to the protection of every department and branch of the government. A determined effort is on foot to drive these men out of employment. I am concerned for their interests. Are their interests of no concern to you?"

Woman Lost Mate in Fire, Sues Son of Chicago Packer

Chicago, Aug. 19.—Edward J. Cudahy, son of the packer, was sued for \$10,000 damages by Mrs. Margaret J. Low, whose husband, John Low, died a year ago from burns suffered when he rescued the two sons of Mr. Cudahy from their burning Lake Forest home. In the bill it was explained that Mr. Cudahy had promised to make a settlement on Mrs. Low as a result of her husband's death but has not done so.
