Dublin, Aug. 19.--(By A. P.)--There was heavy firing all last night throughout the city of Dublin between national army forces and re-publican irregulars. Free state troops on patrol fired at snipers and machine gunners, who attacked national army posts in various parts of the city. The plans of the irregulars, however, were frustrated by the vigilance of the national trops, it was stated today.




