The disturbance followed what was apparently an organized effort to drive the speaker from the stand by heckling. When Woolwine started to tell of his activities involving the Ku Klux Klan in Los Angeles, scores of persons in the crowd began hooting and cat-calling.

A man arose near the front row and called the district attorney a liar. Several persons started toward him and a fight seemed imminent, when Councilman H. S. Kiernan threatened the men with arrest,

The police arrived a moment later.
No arrests were reported.
Representatives of Mr. Woolwine's office are prosecuting in Los Angeles a criminal action against 35 alleged members of the Klan as a result of a raid on a place Klan members have said they believed to be an illicit liquor dispensary. One man was killed in the raid.

Mr. Woolwine showed a disposition to talk back to his tormentors on a number of occasions. Near the end he became angry and told one of them "to go home if he wanted to."
