

Two Former Golf Champions Are Eliminated in Nebraska State Tourney

Ralph Peters and Guy Beckett Lose—Harry Donovan to Play Foye and Reynolds Meets Shepard Today

Three Extra Hole Matches Played in Championship Flight—Champ Young Eliminates Ben Yousem in Afternoon

---Reed Beats Hughes.

PLAY in the first and second rounds of the championship flight of the state golf tournament yesterday at the Field club witnessed the downfall of two former state champions and the advancement into the third round of one municipal golfer.

Ralph Peters, flying the colors of Charlie Johnson's club, and Guy Beckett of the Field club, two former champs, fell before the clubs of "Cap" W. J. Foye and Phil Downs, respectively, while Harry Donovan, the youngster from over Fontenelle way, mowed down J. J. Halpine of Omaha in the first round and then eliminated R. H. Garrett of the Miller Country club after lunch.

The favorites all came through the first round with flying colors except Francis Gaines and Guy Beckett. Gaines, who hails from the Country club, was put out of commission by Phil Downs of the Field club. Downs downed Gaines on the 18th when he ran a 40-foot putt for the match.

Beckett loses match. Beckett, who was eliminated from further championship play by Ben Yousem, a municipal golfer from Fontenelle and former "munny" champ, Yousem defeated Beckett, 3 and 2.

Three extra hole matches were reeled off in the morning of the championship flight. R. H. Garrett went to the 19th hole to beat Francis Donovan, while James Harvey made Kenneth Reed, champion in 1918, play 20 holes in order to advance further in the main flight of the tournament. Jack Hughes of the Field club beat Harold Palmer, Central high school golf champ, 1 up on No. 19, after a nip and tuck battle from the first nine.

Sam Reynolds of the Field club and four times state golf champion and still young enough to win four more championships, put Gene Slatery, champ of Lincoln, out of the running in the first round, winning with ease, 7 and 6.

Slatery is the lad who topped Reynolds' clubs and bag for two consecutive years at the Field club. Gene received his early golf training at the Field club, where he acted as caddy, but he was unable to pull the "Johnny Black" stuff on Reynolds yesterday.

Shepard Beats Downs. In the second round of the big flight, Wally Shepard, who is looming up as a dangerous contender for the title, put the blinkers on Phil Downs and Shepard made the first nine in 37 and Downs in 38.

This morning the victor will meet Sam Reynolds. This match seemed to be the talk of the golfers late yesterday afternoon and these two club swingers should play before quite a gallery today.

Shepard is playing a good game. The same can be said to Reynolds. Sam's game seems to get better as he advances in tournament play, while Wally's game has advanced to third round matches in previous tournaments, only to lose out in the semi-finals. If Shepard can shake the jinx that has been following him, he should plow through the field to the title.

Reynolds extinguished "Laddy" LaDoucer's championship lights in the second round, 4 and 3. Sam shot the first nine in par figures, halting up a 36, while his opponent took a 41. Reynolds turned the corner 3 up on LaDoucer and gradually increased his lead until the match ended, 4 and 3 to play.

Sam Gets Eagle. In defeating "Laddy" LaDoucer, Reynolds shot 11 holes in par figures, one in birdie and another in eagle. Sam scored an eagle on No. 3 green, a par 5-hole with a distance of 450 yards. The birdie was made on No. 14, a par five tin.

Yesterday was a Donovan day for R. H. Garrett. In the morning Garrett eliminated Francis Donovan, 1 up on 19 holes and in the afternoon ran into Harry Donovan, the lad who shot a 75 Monday, in the second round of the big flight.

The cards turned in by Harry Donovan and Garrett were nothing to brag about, but as Donovan won it didn't matter. The Country club golfer started to eliminate the younger Mr. Donovan and had his opponent four down at the turn. Donovan got a three on No. 9, while Garrett took a four.

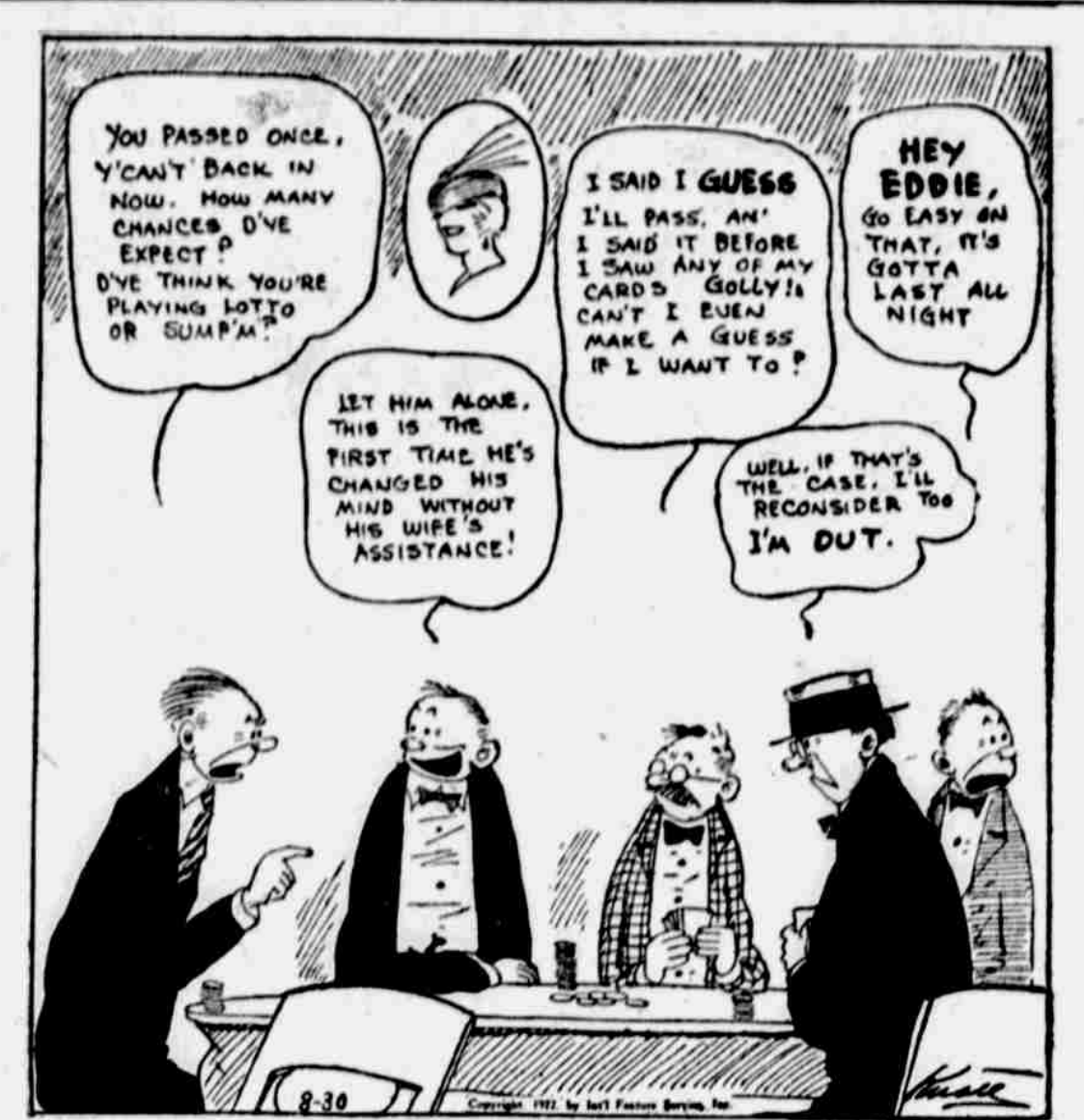
Starting with the 10th, Donovan cut his opponent's lead down to three. Garrett copied No. 11 and was four up on Harry. They both halved the 12th, getting three. Donovan took the 13th tin and both halved the 14th with fours. The Fontenelle golfer hit his stride in putting on the 15th and from then on clipped down Garrett's lead until he won, 2 up.

Donovan Plays Foye. Harry Donovan tangles with "Cap" W. J. Foye today and he is likely to be on the short end of the score. Foye put Ralph Peters, Country club, and former state champion, out of the running when he won, 1 up.

State Champion Blaine Young of the Field club cut short Ben Yousem's championship hopes in the second round when he defeated the Fontenelle golfer, 3 and 4. Blaine went out in 36, which is par, while Ben's score was 40. The champion was 6 up on the forty-fourth hole at the end of the first nine. Yousem won the first four holes on the inside and then Young took the next two tins by ringing up a pair of birdies on Nos. 13 and 14. Young had to shoot under par ball to win these two holes. They went 30-30 on No. 15. Kenneth Reed put his clubmate Jack Hughes out to play on the 19th

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Saints Divide Honors in Twin Bill With Omaha

Buffaloes Win Free Hitting Contest, 13 to 8, and Lose Second, 3 to 6—Unable to Hit Adams.

The fall festival of base hitting and run scoring was staged by the Omaha and St. Joseph ball clubs at Fifteenth and Vinton street lot yesterday afternoon, when the two teams hammered the ball around the park for more than three and one-half hours and divided honors in a bargain day program.

In the opening contest, the Buffaloes blasted out a 13 to 8 victory, but were unable to solve the offering of Karl Adams in the second and dropped the supper event to the visitors, 6 to 3.

First a Slugfest. The first contest was a free hitting game in which the home crew got the jump on the Saints by driving in eight runs in the first two stanzas. The Buffaloes drove South-paw Lindberg from the mound in the second inning and continued their heavy hitting against Grover and Lucien. Every man in the Buffalo lineup got at least one base hit, while all except Spencer connected safely twice or more times.

The game was featured by extra base hits, which produced runs galore. The Buffaloes scored twice in the first inning and made an effort to put the game on ice in the second when they shoved over six runs. The Saints registered twice in the fourth and threatened the Buffaloes' lead by chasing over five more in the fifth. The home boys came back strong, however, and got back four of the five runs in their half of the fifth.

Apperson Stars. Dailey was responsible for the defeat suffered by the Buffaloes in the second game. He started the contest and pitched to only five batters, four of whom hit safely. Two of the four hits were for two bases. He was relieved by Darrough in the first, but before the side had been retired, the Buffaloes tallied five times, giving Adams a lead which the Buffaloes were unable to overcome. After the first inning, Darrough twirled arctic ball and probably would have won the game if he had been selected to start the game.

Apperson was the star performer of the day. In the first game he made two doubles and a single in four times at bat, scored two runs and had seven chances in the field. In the second contest, he tripled and scored the Buffaloes' first run. In both contests he made spectacular long running catches of foul flies. He also stole two bases and had a sacrifice hit in the initial contest.
