Wheat Crop Below  
10-Year Average

Estimates of 5,000 Mill and Elevator Operators Indicate 48.7 Per Cent Is Below No. 2 Grade.

Washington, Sept. 1.—(Special Telegram.)—The quality of the winter wheat crop this year is 41 points below the average for the last 10 years, according to reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture from its official crop reporters. Estimates made by about 5,000 mill and elevator operators in all parts of the winter wheat producing section, based on early receipts, indicate that 48.7 per cent of the crop is below grade No. 2. In 1921 the quantity grading below No. 2 was 40.4 per cent and in 1920 it was 29.5 per cent.

United States Rain Maker  
Hailed as Hero by Italians

Dr. Charles Hatfield Given Credit for Torrential Downpour Following Four Weeks of Torrid Drouth—Movement on Foot to Pay American 1,000,000 Lire for Secret.

Rome, Sept. 1.—Dr. Charles Hatfield, the American rain maker, is a bigger hero in Italy than Gabriel d'Annunzio, because of a torrential downpour in southern Italy after four months of torrid drouth.

Dr. Hatfield came to Italy a couple of weeks ago with his apparatus for making it rain and established headquarters at Naples while he was studying conditions. Then he disappeared and even the American embassy was not aware of his whereabouts.

A movement is on foot by the government to pay Dr. Hatfield 1,000,000 lire for the secret of causing precipitation.

In 1905, southern California, entering upon the second year of a

costly drouth, was thrown into a state midway between skepticism and hope when Dr. H. Hatfield, who was experimenting in the Altadena foothills, announced that he could make it rain by a secret chemical process he had discovered.

He was offered \$1,000 by Los Angeles business men if he succeeded in making it rain. Nineteen downpours totalling 19 inches of rain fell in the specified time and he collected from the scoffers.

From that time on he was summoned to various localities, including Wisconsin and Medicine Hat, Alberta, where the aridly spelled crop failures. He collected large sums in bonuses and generally was asked to call off Jupiter Pluvius because of extensive precipitation.

He has never divulged the secret of his rain making beyond stating that his chemicals attract moist atmosphere. The chemicals are contained in a tank and are projected into the air from a high tower.

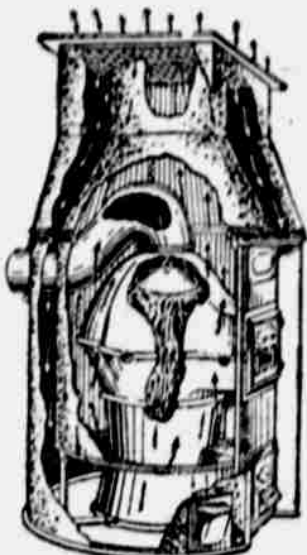
