

Experts Search Entire World for Chorus Costumes

Each Girl in "Smiles of 1922," Ak-Sar-Ben Extravaganza, to Wear 300 Feet of Pearls.

When it was decided to present the "Smiles of 1922," which will appear, evenings only, in front of the grandstand at Ak-Sar-Ben field, September 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16, in conjunction with the Ak-Sar-Ben fall festival, experts were sent to all parts of the world to gather up the material necessary for the costumes. One of the scenes depicted an oriental setting and necessitated each girl in the entire chorus wearing strings of pearls 300 feet in length.

As real pearls were out of the question, the alternative was "reconstructed pearls," a mechanical product which would deceive anyone but a jewel expert. Estimates of experts showed that 75,000 imitation pearls would be needed for the costumes. It took a factory employing 350 people two months to turn out the order and then six women worked for nearly four months stringing the pearls into the required lengths. In order that only one pearl would be lost in case the string broke, it was necessary to tie a knot after each one of the 75,000 jewels.

"Yes, indeed, a very knotty problem," says Ernie Young, Chicago impresario, who is bringing the "Smiles" here after a successful tour of America. "But this is only incidental and but one small scene in the best 'Smiles' production I have ever put on."

Butler Would Save Tax Payers Interest Penalty
City Commissioner D. E. Butler recommended to the city council yesterday that the city charter should be amended so as to permit property owners assessed special taxes for grading improvements to pay the full amount of the tax and save the interest penalty. Under the existing charter grading special taxes may be paid in five annual installments plus interest, but no provision is made for eliminating the interest when the tax is paid in full at the time the improvement is made.

Attorneys Under Fire Granted Continuance

J. E. Van Dorn, Charles J. Southard and John O. Yeiser, charged with unprofessional conduct as attorneys in a report filed two weeks ago by a committee of the bar

appointed by the district court, obtained a continuance of their cases until after September 20.

They had been ordered to appear yesterday to show cause, if any, why the court should not carry out the recommendations of the committee for suspension for Van Dorn and reprimand of Southard and Yeiser. Van Dorn was charged with trying

to get affidavits of witnesses changed and Yeiser and Southard with taking exorbitant fees.

Yeiser filed a voluminous defense of his action and Southard filed technical objections to the action taken by the committee against him.

as a witness in custody of Deputy Sheriff Charles Hoye.

York is serving a sentence at the state reformatory at Lincoln, having been convicted of taking watches while an employe of the T. L. Combs & Mazer company last spring. He is now giving evidence to assist his former employers in recovering three watches from Isador

Fredman, who advanced money to York, according to the evidence.

While in the movie, here York was an associate of Andre Delacour, champion ski jumper of France and a runner-up in a nation-wide contest for the hand and heart of Audrey Munson, "The Perfect Model."
