Antepodeous Literally Tear American Team Apart in Davis Cup Match at Forest Hill.

Forest Hills, L. I. Sept. 2 .-Australia's quest for the Davis cup. emblematic of the world's team tennis champion, has not been in vain. Regardless of the final outcome of Monday's play the work of Pat O'Hara Wood and Gerald Patterson in the doubles match, when they defeated William T. Tilden II and Vincent Richards, 6-4, 6-0, 6-3, this afternoon, will stand in the annals of American tennis as one of the greatest exhibitions ever witnessed on the continent. As a result of their victory the score stands tonight two matches to one in favor of the United

Defeated three sets to one by the same combination at Boston on Mon-day for the United States champion-ship, the antipodeans came back to-day on the courts of the Westside club and literally tore the American team apart. No greater display of team tennis in all its multiple re-quirements has been seen since Norman E. Brookes and Anthony Wilding, the famous Australian racquet masters, won a similar match on the same stretch of turf in 1914. Incidentally it was the first time since that year that Australian players have won a match from the United States in Davis cup play. Auzzies Invincible.

The challenging combination was simply invincible this afternoon. Wood and Patterson so completely outplayed Tilden and Richards that the latter appeared almost in the light of novices by comparison. Certainly as team partners they played in the light of strangers. There was no disposition of the play in which the American stood out as superior to the Auzzies. Outshining the other players on the court was Pat O'Hara Wood. No such exhibition of light-ning-like stroking and thinking has been witnessed since Brookes flashed his racquet eight years ago. 


