

### Teacher Must Be a 'Good Sport,' Says Beveridge

#### Instructors for 1922-23 Term Hear Speech of Welcome and Advice by Superintendent.

Public school teachers who, starting this morning will have charge of instructing youth of the city during the 1922-23 school term, assembled at the First Methodist church yesterday morning to get their assignment and to listen to a speech of welcome and advice by Superintendent J. H. Beveridge.

At the opening of the meeting, the teachers rose and stood a minute in silence, out of respect for teachers who have died during the last year. Superintendent Beveridge urged that the teachers "put all the brains that can be awakened through all the senses" into their work. He advanced the thought that physique is a part of personality, and urged that all instructors keep their physical condition good, advising some kind of recreation as a means.

**Unequalled Opportunity.** "You may not have thought of it, but one-fifth of the population of America starts to school this week," said the superintendent. "The teacher has an unequalled opportunity for leadership in this time of social unrest."

Superintendent Beveridge advised the teachers to "go into the business of salesmanship." He told them to "sell themselves to the pupils and the neighborhood," and to do this he advocated the use of "small, common, vivid" words.

"I'm not going to prescribe any manner of dress," continued the superintendent. "The teacher should endeavor to make herself attractive. If she has her hair cut it's all right with me. But don't carry your desire to look well to the stage of being finicky."

**"Must Be Good Sport."** That scientific investigation has shown that the man or woman, whether young or old, may be equally good instructors, "just so they keep young," was asserted by Mr. Beveridge. In closing he declared the teacher must be a good sport.

### Celebration of Ted Jed Sokol Opens in Omaha

#### 350 Delegates Expected—By-laws to Be Changed to Admit English-Speaking Members.

Three hundred and fifty delegates from all parts of the United States are expected to be in attendance this morning at the opening business session of the quintennial celebration of Ted Jed Sokol, western Bohemian fraternal society, at the Sokol hall, Thirteenth and Martha streets.

One hundred of the delegates registered yesterday and according to the local committee, 250 others would arrive by nightfall.

The society has 21,000 members, 7,000 of whom are in Nebraska and 1,500 in Omaha. The most important event of the convention will be a change in the by-laws which will allow English speaking relatives of members to join the order. As it is today, only Bohemian speaking mem-

bers are eligible for membership.

The delegates, after their business meeting today will be banqueted, given auto rides and also will visit the monument of John Rosicky, founder of the order, in Bohemian National cemetery.

Five hundred persons attended physical exercises and a dance held Sunday at the preliminary opening of the convention at Sokol hall. Stanley Serpan, Czech-Slovak consul, addressed the meeting Sunday afternoon on the achievements of the organization in training its members in both American citizenship and physique.

Serpan's address, music by the J. Kalacny, jr., orchestra, vocal selections by a male quartet, and calisthenics by the Tyrs girls, junior boys, senior boys and junior girls, and a tennis racket drill by the senior girls were features of the afternoon program.

Only American citizens are members of the organization, which was formed 60 years ago in Omaha and is an American pioneer in physical training.
