

Budget System's Author to Stump State for G.O.P.

Perry Announces Senator McCormick and C. Frank Reavis as First of Republican Campaigners.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 7.—Senator Medill McCormick, author of the national budget system, will speak at various points in Nebraska on national topics during the campaign, it was announced today by E. B. Perry, chairman of the republican state central committee, following a meeting of the state executive committee.

The exact dates of McCormick's speeches will be determined in a short time, Chairman Perry said. Perry also announced that C. Frank Reavis, former congressman, had volunteered to spend two weeks stumping in Nebraska in behalf of the national and state tickets.

Reavis, while in congress, was a member of a congressional investigation committee that hared to the country the gigantic frauds and scalps perpetrated during the war in awarding and fulfilling contracts. He is expected to recount the financial tragedies enacted, and outline the gigantic task of reconstruction and curtailment of expenses falling on the shoulders of the republican administration. The state and national candidates in Nebraska will fill a regular speaking schedule to be arranged by Perry at places where speakers are desired. Other speakers will be supplied.

Emancipation Proclamation Issued by Mayor Dahlman
Mayor Dahlman went to Lincoln to attend the state fair yesterday.

Acting Mayor Dan Butler wiped a trickle of perspiration from his brow and issued an oral proclamation that straw hats may be worn until the snow falls.

Before leaving Mayor Dahlman issued this proclamation:
"To the people of Omaha: On September 12, the colored people of this city will celebrate Emancipation day. Fitting exercises have been arranged and every man and woman of the colored race will wish to be present. I would personally urge of colored help arrange to give them their freedom on the afternoon of that date, to enable them to participate in these exercises. The day has a deep and holy significance to these people and those of us who can and will enable them to observe it in a fitting manner are helping to raise the standard of true Americanism."

\$100,000 Manufacturing Plant Is Incorporated in Fremont

Fremont, Neb., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—The Midwest Manufacturing company, incorporated for \$100,000, is the latest addition to Fremont's list of industries. Mayor C. H. Green is president of the new company; B. C. Whitmore, Valer, vice president; Beach, Hummer, Fremont, secretary; John Mounich, Fremont, treasurer; C. A. Mogal, Omaha, director. L. P. Byars, Omaha, has been chosen general manager of the plant. The company was organized following the purchase of the plant from the Nebraska Foundry and Manufacturing company some time ago. The organization has \$50,000 paid up stock.

High School at Fremont Has Record Attendance

Fremont, Neb., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—The attendance record at Fremont High school was broken this year with the enrollment of 569 students, 83 more than registered the first day last year. Superintendent A. H. Waterhouse is confident that the roll of students will reach 600 in the high school before the term is well under way.

It is expected that Fremont's new \$100,000 junior high school will be ready for occupancy by January 1, relieving the congestion that exists at present.

Two Men Seriously Hurt in Car Crash Near Ellis

Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 7.—(Special Telegram.)—Charles Christ of Plymouth suffered a fractured arm and Lewis Chapman of Sarbine a badly mangled nose and other serious injuries when their cars crashed into each other on the Goldenrod highway a few miles west of Ellis. The injured men were brought to a hospital here. It is said that both cars were running without lights, having "short-circuited" because of a thunder storm in the Ellis vicinity.

Columbus Lets Contract for Municipal Improvements

Columbus, Neb., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—Zuerlein & Woerth, local contractors, were given the contract for rebuilding the city pump-house and putting in the new water control foundation. Their bid was \$12,700. The Omaha Steel works was awarded the contract for erecting the steel tower and storage tank on its bid for \$16,900. J. F. Devlin of Sioux City is to construct the extension to the storm sewer. His bid was \$5,518.

Irrigation Ditches Are Closed Due to Dry River

Columbus, Neb., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—Unusual drouth conditions that have resulted in a complete drying up of the North Platte river near its junction with the South Platte, led today to the closing, by order of the state irrigation department, of all ditches in this valley whose priorities are subsequent to 1894.

This is not expected to have a serious effect on crops, as most of them have matured.

Aurora, Neb., Pastor Quits Post; 'No Faith in Old-Time Religion'

Aurora, Neb., Sept. 7.—J. D. M. Buckner, in a statement accompanying his resignation as minister of the Methodist church here, a post he has held for 11 years, declared there "are standpaters and progressives in religion as well as in politics," and classifies himself with the progressives. "I'm an ecclesiastical progressive; I have no faith in the old-time religion," Buckner declared. The statement also declared its author does not accept the Bible as an inspired book throughout, and regards much of it as a libel on the God he worships.

Regenerative Set Tuned With Ease

Correct Method of Operating Complicated Receiver Not Difficult.

The way to tune in a station on a regenerative set is as follows: First, heat the filament of the tube; second, set the primary inductance switch on a given contact and vary the condenser in the antenna circuit very slowly throughout its range. If the desired station does not come in set the primary inductance switch on another contact and vary the condenser as before. Third, after the station comes in set the condenser at the point where it can be heard the loudest. Then vary the tickler coil on the variometer until the signal comes in with suitable loudness.

Where honeycomb coils are used first heat the filament and place the honeycomb coils which give the desired range of waves in the coil mounting. Set the movable coils at about 30 or 40 degrees with the fixed coil. Second, vary the antenna condenser slightly and then the secondary condenser throughout its range. If the desired station does not come in vary the antenna condenser more and the secondary condenser through its range as before.

When you are soldering the wires from the taps on your coupler to the switch points, and it is found difficult to hold the solder, iron and wire at the same time, remember this kink:

Procure some acid core wire solder, scrape the insulation from the wire for about one-quarter inch and slip the hollow wire over the end of the wire. Flatten the solder on the wire with pliers. While holding the solder with the pliers, break off the solder; place the solder and wire on the contact point and apply the hot soldering iron.

A. B. B., David City, Neb.—Q. What should be the size of loop aerial, flat type, for two-stage radio frequency detector, two stage audio and 600-meter short wave?

A. Four feet square. Start with four turns of ordinary bell wire and add a turn at a time until best results are acquired.
