Bank at Aurora Buys New Wentz Building

Aurora, Neb., Sept. 18.—(Special.)—The Farmers State bank of Aurora has just completed a deal for the new bank building which was built by the W. C. Wentz company and the American State bank in 1920, just prior to the failure of both institutions. The consideration is \$17,500 and the present bank building of the Farmers State bank. The Wentz bank building has been owned by some Grand Island people connected with the Grand Island Trust company. The building is a large two-story one and the first floor is splendidly equipped for banking purposes. It has some of the finest furniture and equipment in the state.

New Minister Lauds Retired Aurora Pastor

Aurora, Neb., Sept. 19.—(Special.)—"I come with fear and trembling yet nevertheless to preach Jesus Christ" was the text used by Rev. Charles G. Goman, the new Methodist minister here in his initial sermon in the pulpit so long occupied by Rev. J. D. M. Buckner who was recently retired by the conference in Omaha because of assertions concerning the Bible.

The new minister was greeted by a large audience composed of friends of Rev. Mr. Buckner, many of them also friends of Rev. Mr. Goman due to his having formerly held a pastorate in this county.

The original plan to have Sunday's sermon preached by Rev. Mr. Embree, superintendent for this division, was abandoned.

Pausing at one time in his sermon, Rev. Mr. Goman pronounced a splendid tribute to Rev. Mr. Buckner. He declared that Rev. Mr. Buckner is a great and good man and that he has done a wonderful work in Aurora and wherever he has been stationed.

Burlington Shop Strikers Take Pledge Against Road

Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 19.—Meeting at Wymore, Neb., a Burlington division point north of here, 200 striking shopmen last night unanimously adopted a resolution never to return to the employ of the system unless it joins other lines in the Warfield agreement. The terms of an agreement with the Burlington non-union shopmen previously announced by President Hale Holden were denounced by Charles Pirie, Wymore labor leader. He also denied that any union men had returned to the Rock Island shops at Fairbury, Neb., west of here. If no settlement is made with the Burlington, Wymore union shop men declared they would go to roads listed as fair.

U. P. Signalman Run Over by Velocipede Succumbs

Grand Island, Neb., Sept. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—Elmer P. Hansen, an employe of the signal department of the Union Pacific, died at a hospital here yesterday as the result of injuries received Saturday near Cozad, Neb. He was making an inspection trip on a railroad velocipede when he was thrown from the vehicle and run over by it.

Stockville Building Burns

Stockville, Neb., Sept. 19.—(Special.)—The frame building next north of the Frontier county bank building burned yesterday with a complete loss of both building and contents. The building was occupied by Mrs. Lizzie Shriver as a restaurant and was one of the oldest buildings in the village.

The fire began in the kitchen chimney on the second floor.

Cows Near Beatrice Tested

Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 18.—(Special.)—During the past week, Drs. Sturgeon and Jerome and Giffy, veterinarians connected with the bureau of animal industry of the Department of Agriculture, cleaned up Liberty township in tuberculosis tests among cattle. In their examination and tested 750 head and found the township 100 per cent clean of the disease. Last year when the tests were made 1-2 per cent reacted.

Valentine Has First Killing Frost in State

55 Low Point in Omaha—Weather Man Promises Fair Skies for Ak-Sar-Ben Pageant.

The first killing frost of the season in the state was reported yesterday morning from Valentine where a drop of 24 degrees during the night brought the temperature down to 30. Culbertson, which a few days ago registered 100 degrees, yesterday reported 35. Low point in Omaha was 55.

Fair and warmer weather is predicted for the parade tonight. Light rains were general throughout eastern and southeastern Nebraska.

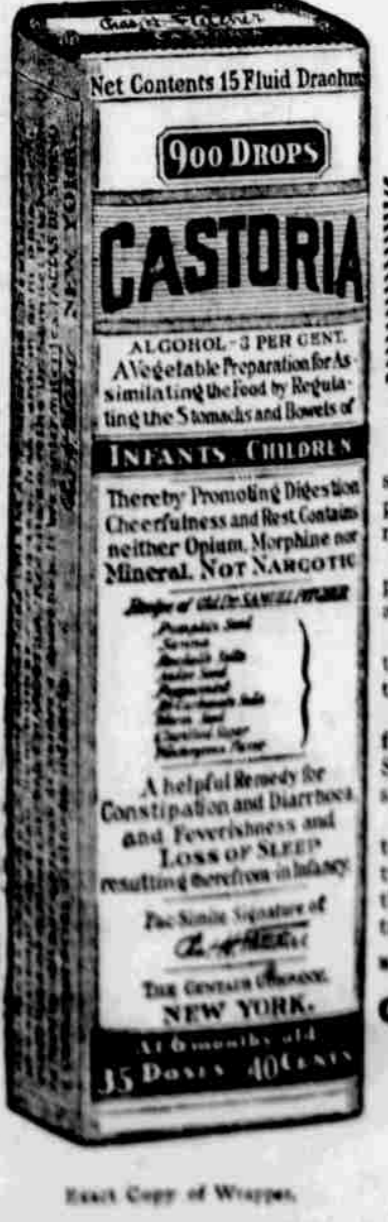
