### Nebraska City Doctor Too Ill to Appear for Trial

Nebraska City, Neb., Sept. 20.—(Special)—M. A. Carriker, practicing physician, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. D. E. Dewey in this city several weeks ago, will not be tried at this term of the district court on account of illness. Judge Begley continued the case on motion of the attorney for Dr. Carriker, supported by affidavits of four physicians that he was physically unable to appear in court at this time.

D. E. Dewey, the husband, also charged with manslaughter in connection with the case, will not be tried at this term since both cases are closely allied. Both trials have been indefinitely postponed.

### McKelvie Exposes Ex-Auditor's Error

Lincoln, Sept. 20.—Governor McKelvie has characterized H. Smith, former democratic state auditor, in a statement giving the total appropriations for 1917 and 1918 as \$9,751,561. The governor points out that in a statement published as auditor of public accounts, Mr. Smith showed that the appropriations made by the 35th session of the state legislature totaled \$11,098,484. The governor declares that to this total should have been added the following items: \$640,000 for federal aid roads; \$21,000 for vocational education; approximately \$10,000 for insurance examination, which was deposited and checked out of a private bank account; approximately \$22,000 fees and expenses turned in by the different examining boards, and approximately \$25,000 fire marshal's

Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 20.—(Special Telegram)—Fire Monday night destroyed an unoccupied tenant house on the farm of Dr. H. M. Heppeler, nine miles southeast of Beatrice. About 500 bushels of wheat stored in the building was consumed. The loss will amount to \$3,000, partially covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is not known.





#### How to Lay Linoleum on Wood Floors



IN summer the moisture in the air causes wood floors to expand. In winter they dry out and contract when the heat is turned on with a tendency to open up the cracks between the boards. Your linoleum floor, therefore, should be cemented (not tacked) over a lining of builder's deadening felt which has been previously glued to the bare floor boards. The felt takes up expansion and contraction and gives you a permanent, waterproof, good-looking floor. The added service and wear this method gives are well worth the extra cost.
