

### Senator Smoot Points Out Achievements of Congress

#### Accomplishments of the Republican Administration Form Long List, Ranging From Relief of Farmer to Big Reduction in Public Taxes.

By GEORGE F. AUTHIER, Washington Correspondent The Omaha Bee. (Special Telegram.)—The republican congress has adjourned with a genuine program of achievement. It is an achievement closely connected with that of the Harding administration itself and the things accomplished share credit with the executive, who has sponsored them, and the congress which enacted them.

Probably the outstanding achievement of this first part of the Harding administration is the arms conference which led the world in the direction of disarmament and insures peace in the most threatening part of the world. Congress had its share in this, also, for the senate was called upon to ratify the treaties. The farmers, under this administration, have been looked after as never before. Their unfortunate situation, the result of the policies that had preceded, placed upon the administration a terrible burden of responsibility. But much has been done and the country is on the way to return to prosperity in which the farmer will share with the rest of the country, despite the interruption furnished by the industrial strikes.

#### Tariff Is Comprehensive.

The accomplishments of the congress were tersely told in the senate yesterday by Senator Smoot of Utah, than whom there is no closer student of financial affairs in congress. The tariff itself, which is the most comprehensive piece of legislation enacted by the congress, gives the farmer the best of it as no other tariff bill has ever done. One of the accomplishments of the administration was omitted by Senator Smoot. It is that liberty bonds have been brought back to par. Senator Smoot's summary follows: "No destructive, no sectional, no class legislation has been passed. "To put more business in government, he enacted the budget law, under which the economy program of this administration was possible. "Reduced the public taxes \$818,000,000 a year, the bulk of which was lifted from families and from average individual incomes. In order that taxes might be reduced it unapologetically cut appropriations. "Found 5,000,000 men idle. To prevent further aggravation of unemployment enacted restrictive immigration law. "Found agriculture facing ruin. To relieve this situation, renewed the war finance corporation, furnished it with a million-dollar revolving fund to loan the farmer in the emergency.

"Passed farmers' emergency tariff which stopped flood of imports that was contributing to agricultural disaster.

#### Revived Buying Power.

"Increased funds of federal farm loan banks \$25,000,000, resulting in revival of agriculture, bringing the farmer who purchased 40 per cent of the manufactured products of the country again in the market and thus giving employment to idle men. "Enacted permanent tariff law which insures industry and agriculture alike protection from competition from abroad and the workingman steady employment and a good wage.

"It enacted the Sweet law, creating the veterans' bureau, consolidating all government agencies dealing with the work of relieving disabled war veterans. For the use of that bureau more money was appropriated than for any other purpose except payment of the public debt and the interest thereon.

"Found the country officially in a state of war with Germany and with Austria-Hungary and by joint resolution re-established peace with the two nations.

#### Passed Maternity Act.

"Enacted great humanitarian legislation asked for by the women of the country, the maternity act, to safeguard welfare of infancy and maternity.

"Created refunding commission, to place our foreign loans on a business basis.

"Authorized formation of co-operative associations, enacted packers and stockyards legislation and the grain futures act for the farmer.

"To promote foreign trade amended the Edge act to facilitate organization of corporations engaged in export business.

#### Reorganized Philippines.

"Provided for the reorganization of the Philippines financial system and an extension of public credits to save the islands from the bankruptcy resulting from eight years of democratic regime.

"Relieved the drought area, extended the time of payments on reclamation projects, granted generous aid for the building of public roads, extended relief for starving millions in Russia, reorganized the Indian bureau, strengthened the federal prohibition amendment, provided for the creation of more federal courts to relieve congestion and within a period of 30 days, ratified seven treaties growing out of the arms conference, leading the world in the direction of universal peace."

### Congressman Free Injured in Wreck

#### Two Companions Are Killed When Motor Car Hits Telephone Pole.

Baltimore, Sept. 23.—Two men were killed and two others injured last night when a big touring car occupied by Representative Arthur M. Free of California, and friends, crashed into a telegraph pole at a bridge at Savage, Md.

The dead are: G. C. Freeman, secretary to Representative Free.

William Dennis, San Francisco. The injured: Representative Free, lacerations of scalp.

N. A. Dennis, San Francisco. Representative Free was brought to the Maryland general hospital in an automobile by W. H. Connell of New York and Father Meyer of St. Mary Catholic church, Laurel, Md.

N. A. Dennis was taken in another machine to Mercy hospital, William S. Dennis was killed instantly in the crash.

No one apparently witnessed the accident. It was not until hours later that Mrs. Free in Washington learned of the accident. She had a dinner engagement with her husband and the Dennises at the Hotel Raleigh in that city. After waiting for them for two hours at the hotel, she returned to her home, mystified by the failure to appear.

### Shophen Settle Strike on Chesapeake & Ohio

Richmond, Va., Sept. 23.—The strike of shophen on the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad was settled early last night at a conference of representatives of the shophen and the management. J. P. Parrish, general manager of the road, announced.

The management, however, refused to consider any adjustment with the striking clerks, Mr. Parrish said.

About 8,000 shophen are included in the settlement, which the general manager stated was "agreeable to both sides."

The road has promised to take the men back within 30 days, according to Mr. Parrish.

The settlement was made on the basis of the Willard-Jewell agreement, with the exception that the same provision for the reinstatement of all strikers was dropped by the negotiators.

### School Girl Testifies in Minneola Murder Trial

Minneola, N. Y., Sept. 23.—A girl who "stayed after school" at noon on the day when her teacher, Miss Edith Lavery, was killed in the parlor of the house where she lived, testified at the trial of William Creasy, of E. Thomas Key, on trial for the murder of the school teacher.

Miss Lavery seemed quite angry with Mr. Creasy, Henrietta Langston, 12, the witness, said on the stand. When he was going Mr. Creasy said "Hail pass you." Miss Lavery snapped right back at him, "No," she said, "I don't want to see you."

### Steps Are Taken to Aid Refugees

#### American Consul at Constantinople to Have Charge of Relief Work.

Washington, Sept. 23.—Steps to extend relief to American refugees from Smyrna, for which purpose congress appropriated \$200,000, were taken by the State department shortly after President Harding signed the bill carrying the appropriation.

Acting Secretary Phillips advised Oscar S. Heiser, American consul at Constantinople, that the appropriation had been made available and notified him that he would have charge of the expenditures.

Consul Heiser was instructed to co-operate with American officials at Constantinople, Athens, Smyrna and Salonika, with a view to arranging a plan for relief of American refugees which will be as comprehensive and economic as possible.

The State department received a report from the American destroyer Edsall, now at Smyrna, that British ships Thursday began evacuating 7,000 refugees. The destroyer Lawrence was due to leave for Salonika today with 400 orphans and students from the American institutions at Smyrna, 14 Americans and certain Armenians employed by American firms at Smyrna.

### Engineer Killed, 26 Injured in Southern Pacific Wreck

Los Angeles, Sept. 23.—One engineer was killed, another so badly hurt he was expected to die, two firemen seriously crushed and burned, and 23 passengers injured when Southern Pacific south bound train No. 78, the Shore Line limited, collided with train No. 38, known as the Santa Paula local, near Mountain, five miles south of Ventura, at 8:30 tonight.
