Even deducting for the recent injury to Sisler's shoulder, which is certain to affect both his offensive and his defensive value, he looms far above Pipp in value and outranks George

The done figures on the first base men offer a queer problem this year. There is no doubt in the world but that Wally Pipp has increased tremendously in position value this season. He has become aggressive, hustling, and is a far better man than he ever has shown himself to be in previous years.

Dope Is Misleading

The dope indicated that Wally had sertied down to be just a ball player, working hard and cornectly and doing what he could. His sudden aggressiveners, his improved hitting against any kind of pitching seemed to indicate that he would show tremendously strong in figures when pitted against the National league pitchers. Yet I find that, in spite of his improvement, he does not dope as strong against the admittedly weak Glant pitching staff as he does against the Everage run of American league pitchers. The Giant pitchers, weak as they are, seem to have something on him. And the slow and fast curve pitching of Jess Barnes and the hooks of Art Nehf promise to trouble him in the coming series if he is fortunate encugh to get into it.

Sister Dangerous to Giants.

Sister, on the other hand, dopes higher in value than he does in his own league, where he is the leader and where he has hannuered every kind of pitching. It would be a fortunate thing for the National league hopes of another world's championship if the Yankees instead of the Browns should win the American league cup, at least as far as first basemen goes. Sister would simply murder the Giant pitching in the present condition of the McGraw staff. Hitting over 400 in his own league, and with the Giant pitchers, besides being crippled and worn, made to order for him, he would force the Giant Infielders to wear mass.

Pipp does not figure as strong eliner in attack or defense against the Gaints as does Sisier, but he figures stronger against the Giants than Kelly against the Yankees' delense. Kelly would be much stron er pitted against the Browns' pitch ing staff and general defensive stru is largely due to the fact that he hard swinging, right-handed batte He would not hit hard against May and Hoyt, not nearly as hard as h would hit against the Browns' pite ers. Shocker alone figures to chec up the hitting of Kelly if the Brown happen to break through and get into this series.

The fact that Kelly's blows are, as Giants divided a dou a general rule, directed toward right ine first, 5 to 2. field, inclines to cut down his figure value in the attack, He gains a few points because if either Browns or Yankees are pitted against him he Lable to do some base running. In fact, I think it will be valuable to you who are doping this series along with me to get busy studying the entchers and the style of play, I think the figures will indicate that there will be a lot more base running if the Yankees and Giants meet than we have seen in the season.

Values of men who have been fixtures for years are changing suddenly and one must watch the figures all the time for alterations. Sisler has made tremendous gains over his already high total in position value and Pipp has gained almost as much in proportion. Nehf's Recovery from Injury Is **Boon to Giants**

Chicago, Sept. 27.-Free from pensant worries, after one of the most strenuous campaigns in their career, the New York Giants, 1922 National league champions, wound up the bat de against western opposition by taking the final game of the series from the St. Louis Cardinals, 6 to 2, behind Artio Nehf's steady twirling. It was the third defeat in four

games for the team which threatened the Giants' supremacy for a large share of the season and shoved the Cardinals back to fourth place, while Cincinnati, trouncing Philadelphia, 15 to 8, climbed to third position.

Indication that Nehf has practically ecovered from the effects of a foot njury which checked his effectiveness earlier in the season, was regarded as an important factor in the Glants' world series chances. The southpaw held the heavy-hitting Cardinals score less in all but two innings and exhib-

ited perfect control. The Yankees, within a game of linching the American league title, hope to settle the race beyond all doubt by winning from Boston tomorrow in the first of a three-game series with the Red Sox. They hold a lend of three and a half games over the St. Louis Browns, and with but four more contests to play need only a single victory to eliminate the mathe matical uncertainty yet existing. Dazzy Vance achieved his 18th victor; of the season, while Brooklyn pounded two Boston twirlers to win, 12 to 5, 10 the other major league games played
