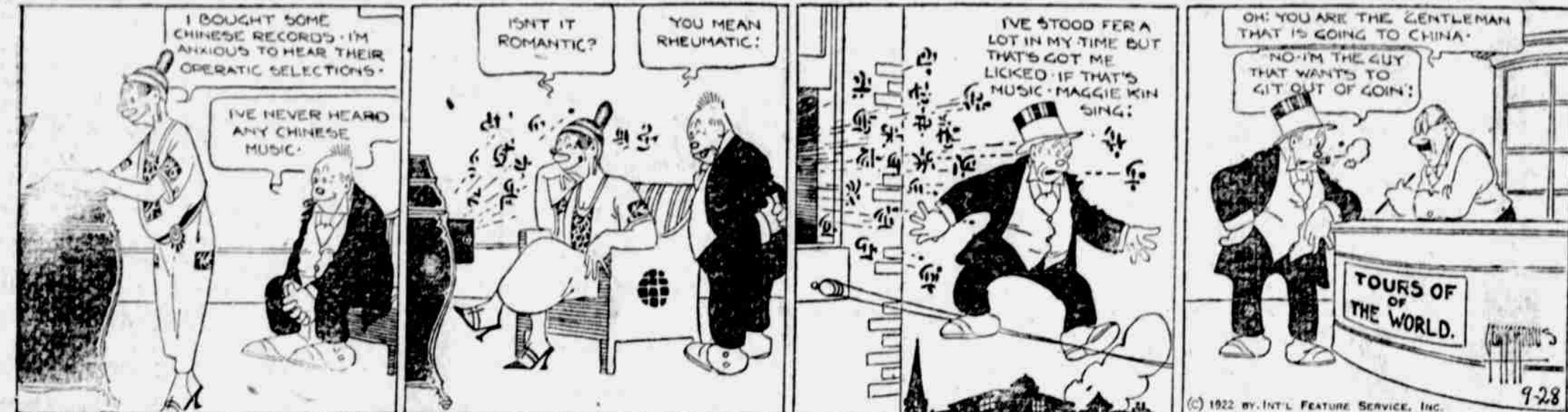

Civil War Peoples' Crusade, Vets Are Told by Kendall

Iowa Governor Tells 8,000 Members of G. A. R. That Conflict Was Not Mere "Sectional Dispute."

BY ORVILLE DWYER Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 27.—(Special.)—Grand Army men in their 56th national encampment here understood last night as never before that the commonwealth of Iowa and the whole United States know something which the G. A. R. has known these 60 years—that the fight was no mere "sectional dispute" but what Lincoln said it was, "a crusade to guarantee that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

at a reception to more thousands on the state capitol grounds. Gave Their All "Men of the G. A. R.," the governor said, "in this hour when we greet you once more for the nation, it behooves us to ask ourselves, who are these men of the G. A. R., and what did they do? What great good did they achieve, what dire evil did they avert for this vile nation? And our answer must be: "They are the men who went out to give their all to answer the question, "Small this nation, dedicated to the proposition that all men are created free and equal, perish from the earth?" and they answered it.

Were Anointed Sons "Men of the G. A. R., you have answered that question for all times. You answered it in the language of immortality, in the fear of God and the presence of the nations.

The governor's speech somehow audaciously lifted this 56th national encampment of the G. A. R. out of the category of a mere annual reunion of war veterans. It transformed the thing into something of vast and significant meaning; a gathering just at this time more important in its effect upon the nation than on the surface it appears to be.

Will, Unopened 77 Years, Names Man Now Dead

Document Discovered in Secret Panel by Son and Daughter of Deceased Beneficiary.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 27.—(Special.)—There recently came to light in an old Worcester homestead a dusty and torn bit of parchment on which was written the last will and testament of James Munro Schofield, wealthy Scotch merchant, to James Munro Schofield 2d, of Worcester, naming him as the sole legatee of an estate valued at 190,000 English pounds. The tragedy of the document lay in the fact that the son failed to open the envelope containing the will, which he received in the year 1845.

Lineman Is Killed Working Near Oteo

Nebraska City, Neb., Sept. 27.—(Special.)—Harry D. Hendricks, lineman, employed by the Nebraska City Water and Light company, was electrocuted while working on the company's power lines into the village of Oteo, which is being connected up with the local plant. Hendricks came in contact with the live wire while attempting to make a connection at the top of a pole, his head coming in contact with the wire while he was shifting his position. A scalded strip on his arm also showed where the other contact was made.

Oteo county, was convicted in district court here of owning intoxicating liquors. This was the third conviction of the Lorton butcher in Oteo county for possession of liquor and Judge Begley sentenced him to one year in the state penitentiary. For the first offense he was fined \$100 and costs in the county court, and on the second was given a 60-day jail sentence. He pleaded with the court that in each instance he had been drunk and that some one had "slipped" the liquor into his place of business.

Separate Ballots Ordered Where Congress Seat Vacant Lincoln, Sept. 27.—Governor McKelvie's election proclamation, under date of September 27, calls for separate ballots in the First and Sixth congressional districts for the election of representatives to fill vacancies. The special ballot is called for by the governor, it was announced, so that the vote on vacancies may be canvassed without long delay. The governor does not designate these as special elections.

Lincoln, Sept. 27.—(Special.)—William O'Connell, an employe of the Iren Biscuit company at Omaha, has been awarded \$15 a week compensation by Commissioner Kennedy, to continue seven weeks. The man suffered a rupture lifting a heavy can. The insurance company denied the liability on the ground that lifting the can was no part of his job. O'Connell also will have medical and hospital expenses paid.

Oteo County Man Sentenced to Prison on Liquor Charge

Nebraska City, Neb., Sept. 27.—(Special.)—Claus Peterson of Lorton, Neb., was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail for possession of liquor. He was fined \$100 and costs.
