

Randall Backed by Powerful Community Force

Nominee for Governor Has Almost Unanimous Support of Home Folks

Unselfishness, Loyalty, Christianity and Desire to Help Needy Mentioned by All Acquaintances—Friend of Farmer and Laborer—Ability, Conscientiousness and Judgment Given High Tribute.

G. O. P. Candidate Supported by Many Democrats.

When C. H. Randall, comparatively unknown outside his own senatorial district, received the republican nomination for governor, Nebraskans unacquainted with the powerful community force behind him wondered how it came about. After the history they read in newspapers how a town and a community had staged one of the greatest demonstrations ever accorded a Nebraska citizen. Then it was that they realized that the nomination of C. H. Randall was due largely to the people of his own community. Many early-day citizens of Randolph had moved to other parts of the state, and wherever they were they talked and worked for Randall.

A newspaper man recently visited Randolph and the community surrounding it to learn how and why one citizen may control a support, almost unanimous in scope. He learned first that the citizens of Randolph do not look upon the governorship as a big thing for Randall. They do look upon his prospective governorship as a big thing for the people of Nebraska. They know him as Charlie Randall, or Uncle Charlie. The reporter interviewed from 45 to 50 persons. He didn't particularly seek favorable interviews, but apparently there was no other sort to be had. Following are a few sentences clipped from the various interviews:

"Stands Square-Toed."
"Charlie Randall is the most able man in this part of the state, and he's all man."

"He stands square-toed. No side-stepper or pussyfoot about him. He'll handle the state's business as he's handled his own."

"If Charlie Randall isn't the farmer's friend then the farmer never had a friend. They call him a banker. He's a farmer."

"No man can say a word against Charlie Randall. He thinks more of his community than of himself."

"Charlie Randall was never in a crooked deal in his life. He's the poor man's friend."

"The farmers of Nebraska are the biggest chunk in the world if they don't support him. They never had a better friend."

"Charlie's no capitalist. He's for the farmer and the laboring man."

"He's square as a box."

"Every penny of the taxpayers' money that goes to the state will be accounted for if Charlie is governor."

"He's one of us. He's careful, constructive, honest and square. He will make one of the best governors the state ever had."

"Judgment and Vision."
"Charlie's no plutocrat. He's always been a friend of the common people."

"He's a wonderful friend to the fellow who is broke now and then."

"He will go in with a free hand. No one can ever get any strings on Charlie."

"Charlie has judgment, ability and vision. He won't make any mistakes."

"He's given many a man his start, particularly farmers."

"He couldn't do a mean thing. He never crowded a man in a financial way."

"He never makes mistakes. He makes up his mind as to the right thing to do and he does it."

"When Charlie Randall broke in with a span of mules and a breaking plow, we knew that a real man had come to Nebraska."

"They say that every man has his price. They can't say it of Randall."

"A vote for him is a vote for efficiency and economy in the state's government."

"There are 11 democrats in our immediate family. Two of them voted for Randall at the primaries and will vote for him in November."

No Political Lines.

No. 1—The little one-story frame house was a palace to Mr. and Mrs. Randall when they occupied it right after their marriage. They planned it and built it in Randolph in 1892.

No. 2—Mr. and Mrs. Randall and their family. Eugene Stewart, now cashier of the Security National bank of Randolph; Miss Harriet Stewart and Miss Lena Stewart were left orphans and were reared by the Randalls. Eugene Stewart's wife also is in the picture. She was formerly Miss Elizabeth Mickey, daughter of ex-Governor Mickey. Mr. Randall is holding in his arms the Stewart baby boy and Mrs. Randall is holding the little girl.

No. 3—Mr. Randall's father is in his 83d year. He came to Nebraska in 1900. He was a freight conductor on the New York Central for years. His wife is seated by him.

No. 4—This house is the present home of the Randalls and was built by them 21 years ago. Before he entertained dreams of a home in Randolph Mr. Randall mowed hay all over that section of town.
