

Shopmen's Strike Upon Total of 83 Roads Settled

Great Western Among Latest of Roads to Enter Agreement With System Federation

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Eighty-three railroads of the United States, operating approximately 65,000 miles of line and employing between 125,000 and 150,000 members of the federated shopcrafts have settled the shopcraft strike with their system federations, according to special bulletin sent to all members of the organization over the signature of E. M. Jewell, president. The latest additions to the settling roads were the Fort Smith & Western, the Georgia, Florida and Alabama and the Chicago Great Western.

Embargoes Cancelled.

New York, Oct. 4.—The Baltimore and Ohio railroad has cancelled all embargoes affecting general traffic movement, W. F. Richardson, freight traffic manager, announced.

Split Among Executives.

It gives, first, a split in the Association of Railway Executives—one group agreeing to a settlement, and the "other bent on destroying the organization," second, willingness of the liberal group to negotiate national agreements on other roads, third, that no negotiation could be found for keeping 125,000 men on strike who could return to work and assist in financing those who remained idle. Justification for the action of the policy committee, the circular declared, is seen in the fact that 21 other carriers, in addition to the original 75, have agreed to the Baltimore plan.

Interprets Injunction.

A second special circular to the membership contained in detail an interpretation of Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson's decision on the injunction bill filed against the organization by Attorney General Daugherty. It was signed by Donald H. Eichberg, attorney for the shopcrafts.

"We cannot interpret the temporary injunction, drafted as its terms are," said Mr. Eichberg's opinion in part, "as in any way restraining or preventing the delivery and other representatives of the shopcraft organizations from doing all in their power to maintain an orderly discipline and conduct of the lawful work of the organization to continue to call for and to expect to receive the loyal support of each and every member and to continue in harmony and with a common lawful purpose to advance the common interests of the organized shopcraft employes."

Increased Pythian Rates Held Illegal

Order Has Not Complied With Laws of State, Supreme Court Decides.

Lincoln, Oct. 4.—Special.—By a vote of five to two, the supreme court has again declared that the supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias does not have a representative form of government and that not having complied with the laws of Nebraska in this respect, it cannot collect the increased rates put into effect some years ago. The question came before the court on two cases from Otoe county, where members now deceased had refused to pay the increased rates, and where the beneficiaries sued for recovery.
