Two men are held by Omaha police and another is wounded in a hospital in Council Bluffs as a result, police allege, of a frustrated attempt to rob the McKinney-Seabury garage at Piggah, Ia., Thursday night. The prisoners gave their names as Oscar Miner, 29, 199 1/2 North Eighth street, and John Robinson, 22, 1512 Capitol avenue. The wounded man, Miner told police, is Dan Hazelrigg, 1903 Capitol avenue.

Railroads Are Threatened by Avalanche of Prosperity

Executives of Roads, Including Carl R. Gray of Omaha, Gather in Capital to Devise Means of Keeping System From Breaking Under Vast Offerings.

By GEORGE F. AUSTIN. Washington, Oct. 6.—Special Telegram.—President Carl R. Gray of the Union Pacific has arrived here from Omaha to participate in a conference of railroad executives which is of the utmost importance to the American public. It is for no less a purpose than to evolve some system, in conjunction with the Interstate Commerce commission, to prevent the transportation system of the country from a threatened breaking down under an avalanche of prosperity. The machinery for transferring the farm crops of the west is seriously imperiled.

Bankers Discuss Allied Debt to U.S. at Final Session

Head of Equitable Trust Company Favors Suspension for 10 Years—Allen Defends Kansas Court Law.

New York, Oct. 6.—The allied debts to the United States and German reparations and settlement of these problems as they may affect the industry and commerce of the United States were the outstanding topics of interest at the third and closing session of the convention of the American Bankers association yesterday.

Suspension Recommended.

Suspension of the debts of France, Italy and other European debtors of the United States for a period of 10 years was recommended by President Alvin W. Kreh of the Equitable Trust company as a means of taking the allied debt question out of politics for a definite period and creating an atmosphere of judicial aloofness in

which the subject might be approached. Any cancellation of Europe's debt to the United States at the present time would not assist either France or Italy in collecting reparations from Germany, he asserted. America must and will keep faith with Europe, he concluded, but Europe must do its part and keep faith with herself.

Defends Industrial Court.

Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas, in a defense of the Kansas industrial court, said that it should not be expected that every time a new contract is to be made between the miners and coal operators, or between railroad heads, that the contract should be the basis of a violent and costly civil war upon the helpless public.

Henry Morgenthau, former United States ambassador to Turkey, in an outline of the situation in the near east, hailed the British forces at the Dardanelles under Sir John Harington as the saviors of the civilization of the world in the last two weeks. "Turkey is a fostering bill which must be destroyed," he asserted, "before there can be peace in the Balkans."

The convention ended in a ball to-night and a 25 cent and a trip to West Point is on the program for Friday.

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—The arrest of a "prominent Arizona business man" as the stranger of Guy N. Bell, deputy sheriff of the Arizona capital.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Oct. 5.—After less than three minutes' deliberation, a verdict of guilty was returned in circuit court here in the case of Joe Forman and Joe Teel, penitentiary convicts who were charged with assault with intent to kill Arthur Muehler, deputy warden. Sentences will be pronounced later.

Convicted of Will Forgery Man Released on Heavy Bond

Hastings, Neb., Oct. 6.—Special.—J. B. O'Connor of Kansas City, convicted of presenting a forged instrument as the will of John O'Connor, yesterday gave increased bond for \$1,000 and left for his home. His motion for a new trial will be heard October 21.

State Asks Supreme Court to Collect Road Donation

Lincoln, Oct. 6.—Special.—Arguments were submitted in supreme court on the application of the state to overturn a decision of the lower court that the township of Bone Creek, Butler county, could not be compelled to make good a pledge to pay \$4,000 of the \$10,000 that it voted the state to pave a roadway across the Platte bottoms to give the farmer a good road to Schuyler. The township voters, at the annual election, made the offer. Now they say that the constitution forbids any donation of state money by a vote of the people at an election. The state contends that the annual meeting was an election such as the constitution makes valid in such cases.
