

Continental Club Hears Kennedy on U. S. Citizenship

Declares Many Americans as Well as Aliens Need to Be Americanized — Sees Normal Conditions.

John L. Kennedy voiced a message of optimism and patriotism in his talk yesterday before the Continental club at the Franklin restaurant. He sees a continued return to normal conditions; a steady improvement in social and economic interests.

Mr. Kennedy asserted that he would not deny the alien citizen the right to talk in his native tongue, but he would insist as a corollary to citizenship an ability to speak and think in the language of this country.

"We are getting back to bedrock and our feet are on the ground," he said. "We must continue to work and work hard. Organized society could accomplish twice as much if we could obtain 100 per cent operating efficiency from those of education or natural ability."

"Those who are favored by education or other advantages have responsibilities which they cannot shirk if they would be good citizens. We need to Americanize many Americans, as well as the aliens who come to our shores."

"A community will go up or down according to the average intelligence and patriotism, and what is true of a community applies to the nation."

Mr. Kennedy made a plea for the rebuilding of a strong American spirit. He believes that members of the Continental club and other noontime organizations, as well as other clubs of the city, have great opportunities in promoting Americanism.

"A strong American spirit will supplant the undesirable and their policies," he said. "We should strive to uplift the standards of society, to cultivate a respect for law and authority. We have individual responsibilities in endeavoring to make our community and our country the best place to live in."

"We make too many laws and we enforce too few of them."
