

Super-Radicals Get Broadside From Beveridge

Indiana Republican Candidate for United States Senator Outlines National Issues.

Richmond, Ind., Oct. 7.—Whether the present economic system is to be developed by the republican party or revolutionized by the democratic party is the real issue of the times, declared Albert J. Beveridge, Indiana's republican senatorial nominee, yesterday.

An antagonistic theory, he said, is held by a conglomeration of political elements made up of the larger fragment of the democratic party, socialist organization, and extreme radicals, who are convinced that our whole economic system is fundamentally wrong and that American institutions are antiquated and inadequate.

Praises G. O. P. Administration. Mr. Beveridge in his opening remarks declared that the president's administration has made progress unequalled and unapproached during the same time by that of any other existing government.

Correct Wilson Tax Plan. "A republican president and congress have already made some necessary alterations in this anti-business and prosperity paralyzing Wilsonian national tax system, and still full steps in the same direction will be taken until business is so relieved that industry and trade can once more go forward freely and at full vigor."

As a means of relieving the transportation situation, Mr. Beveridge declared that the "standard agreement" made by William G. McAdoo with the railway labor unions should be abolished, and that the railroad labor board should also be discontinued.

"American transportation must be freed from the iron hand of artificial and arbitrary governmental direction and placed once more under the control of economic law," he said.

An Expert. Sausalito, Cal., Oct. 7.—Two months ago Mrs. Edith Spreckels Wakefield, society matron of this place, found a burglar in her kitchen. Instead of proceeding in the orthodox fashion and summoning an officer of the law, she insisted on giving the intruder a good meal and sent him on his way rejoicing, with a check for \$150 tucked away in one ragged pocket.

Today Mrs. Wakefield made public a letter from the intruder in which he offered to "go the limit" for her, and suggested that he was the best "second story" man who ever wore a "jimmy."

A Religious War

Mob Threatens Dry Officials

Windows in Saloon Wrecked When Crowd Attacks Prohibition Officers.

Baltimore, Oct. 7.—Four prohibition agents and two assistants were beleaguered for two hours last night in the saloon of Henry Schallitz, Barry and Woodward streets, following a raid.

Several thousand men and women threatened the agents and demolished the plate glass front of the building in repeated efforts to reach the raiders.

Bricks were hurled by infuriated spectators both from the street and showstops, three on the agents' automobiles were cut and the windows and lattice wrecked.

The trouble started as the agents were leaving a small truck with 25 cases of seized home brew. The chauffeur of the truck threatened the crowd with a revolver. In attempting to assist him, the agents were driven into the saloon where they were barricaded from 6 until 8 o'clock.

Forty police reserves held the crowd in check. The raiders were from Washington. A warrant was shown charging the proprietor with selling to one of the agents intoxicating liquor on August 7. No whisky was found.

Searchers Forced to Drop Hunt for Argonaut Miner

Jackson, Cal., Oct. 7.—Search for the body of William Fessel, one of the 47 miners who were trapped in the lower levels of the Argonaut mine August 27 by a fire, and who died before rescuers could reach them, has been discontinued temporarily as a result of the fire breaking out anew in the Argonaut shaft, mine officials announced.

Slayer Hanged Twice Before Life Extinct

Woodstock, New Brunswick, Oct. 7.—Twice reprieved from hanging, the second time because no hangman could be found, Benny Swin, who was convicted of killing two persons, was twice hanged yesterday when a second hangman was called after the first attempt had been bungled.

Swim was sentenced to be hanged July 15 for the murder of his cousin, Mrs. Oliver Swim Trenholme, and her husband, Harvey Trenholme, a returned soldier of Belle Verte. He then died instantly and won a reprieve until September 15.

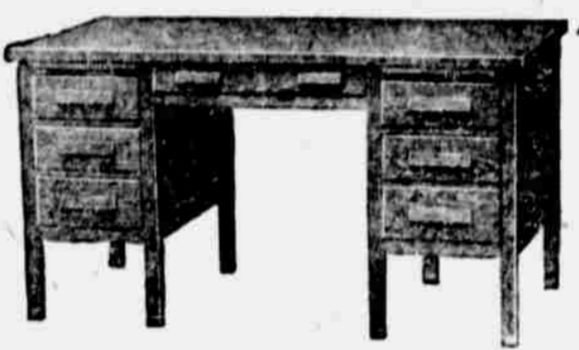

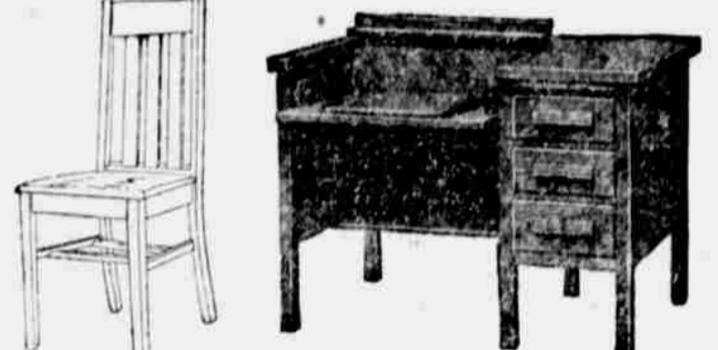

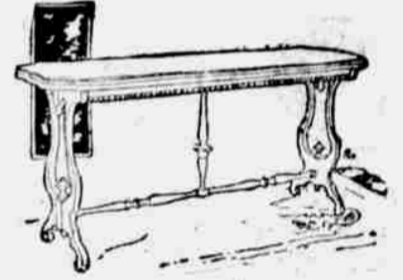
