

Death of Lane May Be Hamper to Fraud Trials

Loss of Attorney Felt Keenly
by United States Attorney
Here—Was Legal
Specialist.

The sudden death of Arthur W. Lane in Lincoln yesterday may seriously impede prosecution of several mail fraud cases set for trial the coming term of federal court.

Lane, who on October 1 became special assistant to the United States district attorney, was in the midst of dictating indictments for the federal grand jury to consider when it convenes tomorrow at 7.

He worked in the Omaha office until late Friday afternoon and expected to return this morning to complete his task.

To E. W. Byrn, department of justice agent, he complained Friday that he was unwell.

J. C. Kinler, United States attorney, and W. N. Childs, postal inspector, expressed their keen regret at the death of Lane, who was said to be a "wizard" in prosecuting mail fraud cases, such as the Berg Potash case. He specialized in these cases for 10 years.

Don Stewart, assistant attorney at Lincoln, was also reported seriously ill yesterday.
