

Rev. R. F. Clark Urges Churches Be Consolidated

Moderator Tells Congregational Conference Plan Would Eliminate Duplication and Bring Economy.

Nebraska, Oct. 10.—(Special Telegram)—Elimination of sectarianism through the establishment of community churches, which would eliminate duplication of buildings and make for economy was the feature of the address of Rev. R. F. Clark of Diller, Neb., moderator of the Congregational churches of Nebraska, in his address before the 66th state conference here today.

Leaders believe that the moderator's address paved the way for acceptance of the Presbyterian plan for federation. This business is to be decided at Thursday's session of the conference. Rev. W. W. Holt of Lincoln, Rev. F. G. Smith of Omaha and Rev. John Andrew Holmes of Lincoln will lead the arguments in favor of the church federation plan.

Rev. Herman Brown of Lincoln, father of Phil Brown, the oldest minister in the state, was not present at the conference, the first meeting of its kind, which the Rev. Mr. Brown has missed in 55 years.

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Slander Breaks Up Engagement of Southern Beauty

A. G. Candler, Atlanta Capitalist, Breaks Engagement to Mrs. Onezima de Bouchel, New Orleans Beauty.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 10.—Mrs. Onezima de Bouchel of New Orleans, whose engagement to marry A. G. Candler, Atlanta capitalist, was announced some weeks ago, made public here today a statement asserting that Mr. Candler broke the engagement because of a report brought to him reflecting upon her character.

Mr. Candler was very much broken up, Mrs. de Bouchel said. Mrs. de Bouchel's statement follows: "Mr. Candler and I were to have been married on the 20th of September. All arrangements were made, the ceremony printed and we were to be at home here in Atlanta on October 10."

"On September 15 he wrote me that it would not be fair to marry me and bring me here where I would be slighted on account of reports circulated here against me."

"These reports, according to him, were that during a confederate reunion in Atlanta three or four years ago when I had the supreme honor of being chaperone general and when I was attended every moment I had solicited two men to visit me at the hotel at night."

"These reports had been brought to him, he said, from sources he was bound to believe just before he was to take the train for our wedding. They would, he said, follow me wherever I might go. I would never be able to hold my head high again."

"This is slander and Mr. Candler's reputation of it and his saying my future is ruined have broken my heart; but my will is not broken and I have faith that God will give me courage to defend myself."

The child's father, the fireman of the plant, immediately discovered the accident but no aid could be given.

Beatrice Woman and Boy Injured in Crash of Autos. Beatrice, Neb., Oct. 10.—(Special Telegram)—Mrs. Clayton Gish of this city sustained a badly wrenched spine and possibly internal injuries, and her little son, Billie, was cut about the head and face, when a racing Oldsmobile driven by Amos Fencil of Diller, Neb., crashed into the Gish car on the Cornhusker highway eight miles south of Beatrice. Gish escaped unhurt. Both cars were badly smashed. Gish said the racer was running about 50 miles an hour when it struck the rear of his car, turning it completely around and throwing his wife and son out on the road.

Auto Thief Escapes After Hot Pursuit. Fremont, Neb., Oct. 10.—(Special Telegram)—Sheriff W. C. Condit, accompanied by a posse of deputies, led a chase for an automobile thief at 3 this morning which ended in recovering the car but the escape of the fugitive.

The man driving the car, said to have been stolen in Central City, entered the yard of John Sheeley, farmer, just west of Fremont, early this morning. The intruder was discovered by the farmer attempting to replenish his supply of "gas" from Sheeley's tank. The farmer fired several shots in the air and the man jumped in his car and disappeared.

Sheeley immediately notified Sheriff Condit. Meanwhile the alleged thief went to the home of Adolph Larson where he succeeded in obtaining a can of gasoline. Before he emptied the gas into the tank of the car, Condit arrived.

Upon discovery of the officers, the unknown tourist dropped the can of gasoline and took to his heels. The officers gave chase, firing as they pursued. The fugitive soon disappeared into a corn field and the officers were forced to abandon their hunt. The car was brought to Fremont.

New Seminary Is Dedicated by Lutheran Synods

Prominent Churchmen Gather at Fremont for Exercises—Rev. O. D. Baltzly on Program.

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 10.—(Special Telegram)—Prominent members of the Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas Lutheran synods gathered here today at the dedication of the \$150,000 home recently acquired by the church for the Western Theological seminary. The property was owned by Ray Nye, former member of the Nye Bohlander Power Co. and was erected at a cost of \$150,000. The palatial building is in the fashionable part of the city and is surrounded by spacious and beautiful grounds, which made a fitting setting for the ceremonies conducted today.

Dean Holmes Dreyer presided at the dedication ceremonies and addresses were delivered by Rev. Oliver D. Baltzly, president of the Nebraska synod, Rev. P. A. Ott, synodical missionary of the Kansas branch and Rev. Ralph W. Livers, representative of the Alumni association.

Other prominent churchmen who were present for the dedication service were Rev. J. R. Leamer, president of the Iowa synod, and Alfred Frank, who represented the student body on the program.

Rev. Frederick G. Gotwald, executive secretary of the United Lutheran Church of America, delivered the main address of the day.

The liturgical service at the dedicatory exercises was conducted by Dr. Ekkliotachs of the seminary. Rev. C. B. Harman, president of the Midland college board, conducted the dedicatory prayer.

Parole Board Hears Appeal of Negro Slayer for Pardon

Lincoln, Oct. 10.—(Special)—The board of pardons and paroles took testimony today in the application of Archie Edwards for a pardon. Edwards was convicted in Alliance of killing his wife, and drew 25 years.

His history is that a dog catcher named Ben Jordan had arrested Mrs. Edwards, and when Edwards interfered they got into a gun battle, in which the woman was killed. All are negroes. W. L. Anderson, who appeared for Edwards, said that it was not established whether a bullet from Edwards' gun or one from Jordan's killed the woman. Edwards pleaded guilty, and his attorney said the judge was unusually severe. He has served nine years.

Mattie Nicholson, Omaha negro, sent up for 1 to 10 years on manslaughter charge, and Beattie Pope, a negro, serving 1 to 20 years for shooting with intent to kill, also were applicants. Mrs. Nicholson stabbed and killed Mrs. Emma Folk, a neighbor.
