Chicago, Oct. 11.—(By A. P.)—J. C. Armour, meat packer and capitalist, declined today to reveal the extent of his speculation in wheat and corn during the period from July 15, 1920, to May 31, 1922.

Admitting that he had been in the market "occasionally" as a speculator during the period under investigation, Mr. Armour declined to name his brokers or reveal the lump sum of his long or short lines on any given day.

Man Sets Date for Restoring Kiaochow Lease

Shantung, Oct. 11.—(By Special Telegram.)—The Japanese government has set October 16 as the date for the restoration of Kiaochow to China. On that date Japanese troops will withdraw, civil and military authority in the Kiaochow district will be handed over to China and the Chinese flag will be hoisted for the first time since Germany acquired the territory in 1915.

Court Is Asked to Keep Amsberry Off Ballot
