Football Facts Worth Knowing --Best Grid Play to Use

Q. Our end on a punt touched the ball first on the opponents' 3-yard line. Defensive player then picked it up and ran with it to his 40-yard line. We claimed it was a touchback. Why wasn't it?

A. A team may refuse the touchback allowed them when an offensive player of other team on a punt touches ball inside its 10-yard line. Rule 6, section 15, and note.

Q. I saw a quarterback try to catch a punt on his 15-yard line. He fumbled it and the ball rolled back of his goal line, where another back of his team fell on it. Referee ruled play a safety. Wasn't it a touchback, as it was a punt?
