

America's Export Trade With Europe Drops in August

Sharp Slump Shown From Year Ago—Imports Increase in Attempt to Beat Tariff Law.

Washington, Oct. 11.— America's export trade with Europe suffered a marked decline in August, dropping to \$155,000,000, as compared with \$205,000,000 in August, 1921. But the value of goods imported from Europe increased as importers hurried shipments across the Atlantic in a race against the final enactment of American tariff legislation. The import total for August, as announced by the Commerce department, along with other trade figures, was \$85,000,000, against \$59,000,000 the same month last year.

Trade with South America increased both imports and exports showing a gain over August, 1921. Exports to South America were \$19,000,000, as compared with \$14,000,000 a year ago. Imports were \$27,000,000 as compared with \$24,000,000 last year.

Figures for the eight months ending with August show that gradual progress is being made toward a balance of trade with both Europe and South America. Exports to Europe for the past eight months were \$1,210,000,000, against \$1,082,000,000 in the first eight months of 1921, and imports from Europe were \$601,000,000, as compared with \$492,000,000 for the same period of last year.

Exports to South America for the eight months period this year totalled \$141,000,000, against \$215,000,000 for the same period last year. Imports from South America have totalled \$124,000,000 up to the end of last August, while last year they had aggregated \$207,000,000.

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Grain values moved up sharply after easing slightly early on the signing of the peace treaty in the near east and in sympathy with a decline of 14 to 34¢ in wheat in Liverpool.

The surplus was taken off the market by the strong commission houses on the break. Stop loss orders were uncovered. Wheat moved up 2¢ to 3¢ from the low and corn rose 11¢ to 18¢. The close was on a reaction due to profit taking and evening up for the holiday. Wheat finished with a net gain of 3¢ to 5¢ and corn 3¢ to 5¢. Oats were 5¢ higher to 13¢ lower and rose up to 16¢.

A good part of the wheat buying was based on the belief that peace would be a strong bullish influence, as it would remove the nervousness which has been a factor in financial and business circles in this country and abroad for some time past. Shorts were free buyers at Winnipeg as well as here, and cash grain sold readily in all markets, with premium advancing in the southwest and in the northwest, due to milling demand.

Increase in Wheat Supply. An increase of 12,000,000 bushels in the world's available supply was larger in Canada and effect. It had no influence on the market trade and joined the reduction of 12,000,000 bushels in the standard world's crop as compared with the figure for the month ago. Existing demand was restricted to 1,000,000 bushels of grain from the west, due to transportation conditions.

The present crop sold at a new high on the present upturn and the deferred deliveries in new ground for the season. The market was quiet, but the offerings were light at times, with a large number of stop-loss orders caught on the market. The market was held in check at 18¢ on the evening of the holiday, and on profit-taking. Built-in selling pressure was evident in the new wheat, although attention was focused with force and receipts of wheat were limited.

Commission house buying of December oats narrowed the discount under May to 14¢, but the market was held in check by the main influence, but as in corn the held over receipts that oats are selling too high. Selling pressure was evident in the market, but not so much as in corn, as compared with December Receipts, 111 car.
