

## Creighton Dean Broadcasts Talk on Public Health

Dr. Von W. Schultz Says War  
Disclosed Much Disease  
That Must Be  
Eradicated.

"The ideal of a sound mind and a sound body is as old as European civilization," declared Dr. Herman Von W. Schultz, dean of the Creighton College of Medicine in a lecture on "Public Health," which was broadcast from the Omaha Grain exchange last night. "Yet public health work in this country has a history of little more than half a century."

Dr. Schultz maintained that health measures have lengthened the average life a period of 30 years through the eradication of such diseases as the yellow fever, bubonic plague, typhoid and smallpox.

"But the signal accomplishments of the public health movement, gratifying as they are, should not blind us to the fact that much remains to be done," he continued. "The experience of the late war reveals a disturbing amount of physical inferiority among men of draft age, and the less lamentable because a large part of it was due to preventable diseases and remediable conditions."

The speaker paid a tribute to the visiting nurse.

"She it is who enters the home of poverty and sickness and grapples hand to hand with distress and misery and ignorance," he declared. "The visiting nurse is the fighting line of society against the scourge, disease, poverty and crime, of which disease is the most formidable. For herself she asks little, the reward is the satisfaction of work well done."

Two men are held as automobile theft suspects by Omaha police on evidence offered by local auto dealers.

They are George Spoo of Exira, Ia., and W. D. Hull of Des Moines, Ia. Spoo, who is 22, and who says he has been employed for four years as a tinner at Atlantic, Ia., is said to have confessed he stole a Ford coupe at Atlantic Wednesday night.

He was "hired" officers allege he stated, and brought the car to Omaha where he parked near the Millard hotel on Douglas street, sleeping all night in the coupe.

Thursday he is alleged to have gone to F. O. Lange, used car dealer, 1621 North Twenty-fourth street, and told him he understood he "got rid of hot cars."

Lange called Lieut. Jack Pazanowski and Sgt. George Summitt of the automobile theft bureau who were told by Spoo that he was only "kidding." The officers allege they found the key to the car in Spoo's pocket.

Hull says he is a salesman for the Yawman & Erbe cabinet company of Des Moines. He is 23. He is alleged to have tried to sell a Ford coupe to the Lincoln Motor company.

He was arrested by Detectives Buglewicz and Ciolek.

He told the officers he lost his car a year ago and after an argument with another salesman made a wager he could steal a car and sell it without being caught.

The car he is accused of having stolen belonged to Thomas P. Rowe, Winterport, Ia., a student at Ames college, according to Buglewicz.

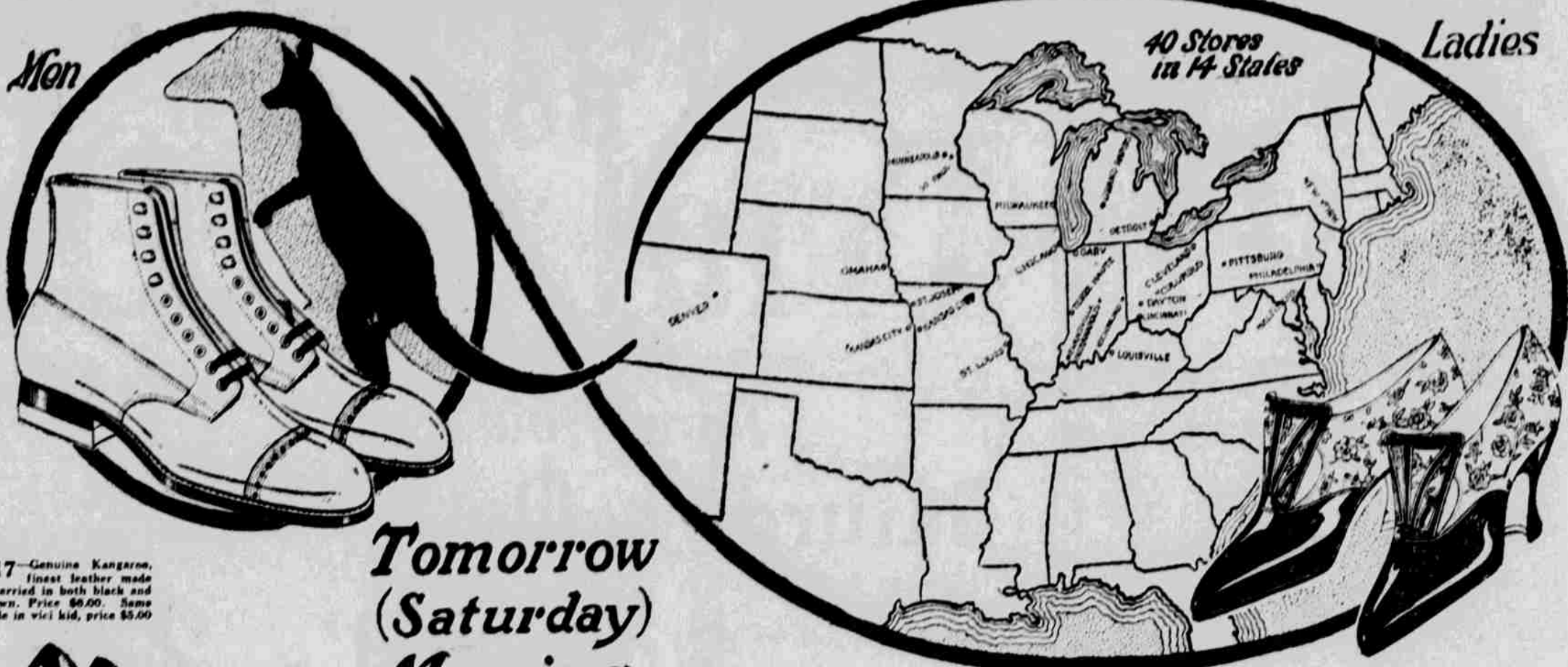
## City Ice Plant Employee's Widow Gets \$1,000 for Death

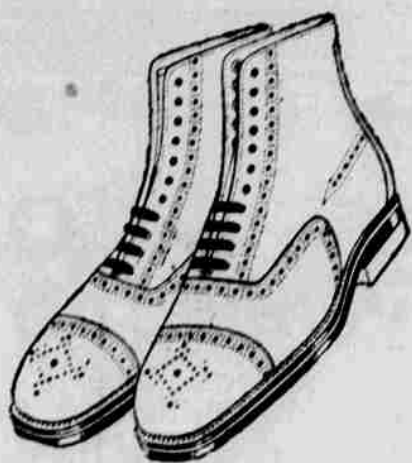

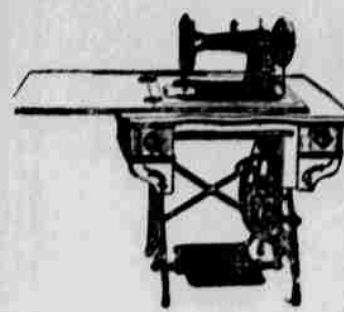
