

Literary Digest Leads Drive for Near East Relief

Advertisements Tell How It Borrowed Money to Make Possible Immediate Aid to Sufferers.

More than half a million men, women and little children swept along by starvation, madness and self-destruction in the near east.

Such was the message carried to the offices of the Literary Digest September 25 by a committee representing the near east relief, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.

"America hears, its heart is big; but the need is now," said a committee man.

Magazine Finances Relief. Then, possibly without precedent, the Literary Digest itself, a private concern, decided to finance the organization.

"Buy," it snapped. The Clontarf, a ship, sailed immediately for the stricken area with tons of necessities.

One hundred and seventy-six thousand dollars was spent. "Buy more if necessary" was the next command from the Literary Digest.

"We are going to discount our faith in the people of America and borrow the money and finance your needs."

Now it's calling on America to make good its faith. With the approval of President Harding, of the Red Cross, the near east relief, the Knights of Columbus and other organizations, it is appealing to the public to subscribe to the bill and provide funds for continued relief.

It made the first subscription, \$10,000, and in full-page advertisements, paid for privately, one of which is being reproduced in the Omaha Bee, is explaining what it did and what it asks.
