Couple Agree That Wealth Does Not Mean Happiness

Publisher Asks Annulment—Wife Charges He Attempted to "Starve Her Into Submission."

New York, Oct. 19.—Wealth does not always bring happiness. That is about the only point of agreement between Nelson J. Peabody, publisher, with office in New York, Boston and Chicago, and his wife, Lois.

Mr. Peabody has instituted suit for annulment of his marriage on the ground that, like Rodolph Valentino, movie star, his wife was married to him before her California divorce became final. Today supreme court Justice Wagner granted Mrs. Peabody \$150 a week alimony and \$750 counsel fees pending settlement of the case.

This is Mrs. Peabody's side of the story, contained in an affidavit: "When he was a poor man I struggled along with him. I washed, cooked and scrubbed in order to assist him. When he became wealthy I shared in his prosperity. Now that he is in receipt of a fabulous income, he institutes an action to annul our marriage, claiming that it is void by reason of a technicality. Then he seeks to starve me into submission."

Mr. Peabody denies he ever sought to avoid his duties as a husband and charges that while he was absent from home, suits occupied by him and his wife at various hotels served as "a place of rendezvous" for various men whom he names.

Body of Drowned Movie Man Found

Theater Manager Dies in Attempt to Rescue Dog from Stream.

Scottsbluff, Neb., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—After dragging the government irrigation ditch for 28 hours, searchers yesterday afternoon found the body of W. E. Calhoun, local motion picture theater manager, who drowned while trying to rescue a game dog from the swift current, 12 miles northwest of this city.

Mr. Calhoun could not swim, and a weed on the bank of the ditch gave way as he reached for the dog, which had jumped into the stream to get a duck that had been shot.

The dog later scrambled from the water, but the theater man did not reappear.

The body was found two and a half miles below the point where the drowning occurred. Fully 100 Scottsbluff men joined the search when the news of the drowning reached the city.

All occupants were pinned under the car and were released by a wedding party passing a few minutes after the accident. An inquest will be held.

S. L. of W. V. Head Scores Victory

Women Voters Fail to Endorse Certain School Board Members.

A victory for Mrs. G. C. Ryan, president of the State League of Women Voters, was scored yesterday at a meeting at the Y. W. C. A. when the local executive board, in deference to Mrs. Ryan's policy, declined to endorse certain members of the Omaha school board, although the committee of investigation requested such endorsement.

Mrs. J. H. Dumont and Mrs. Sherman Welpton, who were appointed to investigate the 15 candidates, recommended the seven men whose terms expire this year and who are standing for reelection. They are John Bekins, D. C. Eldridge, A. M. Eaton, Max J. Walker, W. C. Ramsey, R. A. Van Orsdale and Dr. F. A. Faulk.

Mrs. Ryan had expressed herself as opposed to endorsement of any candidates, even nonpartisan ones, until the issue has been settled at the state convention to be held in the near future.

Mrs. Dumont urged that it would be difficult for any new members of the board to come into office and be intelligent about the large building program being carried out.

Her report was accepted by the executive committee, but a motion that the committee's ticket be recommended for endorsement by the league was defeated by a vote of 6 to 5.

Dr. Caroline B. Hedger Speaks in Fillmore County

Geneva, Neb., Oct. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The health campaign for this county was started, when Dr. Caroline B. Hedger of Chicago made an address at Geneva in which she discussed signs of malnutrition in children and stated that children should eat everything, specifying that 15 kinds of vegetables should be included in their diet. In the evening, Dr. Hedger talked on the kind of child the school should expect of the home and the kind of child the home should expect of the school from a physical standpoint. This speech was made before school teachers and school boards at Geneva. Dr. Hedger addressed the woman's club here and the closing address was given at Fairmont.
