

**Omahan Speaks at Library Meet on Lack of Funds**

**Regional Conference at St. Joseph Told by McCullough That \$1 Per Patron Needed.**

St. Joseph, Mo., Oct. 18.—Public libraries have a hard time getting adequate money, Bruce McCullough, vice president of the Omaha public library board, told the Missouri valley regional conference of the American Library association, which closed a three-day meeting here tonight.

"Especially in the growing west," Mr. McCullough said, "no hard and fast rule can be formed, but generally an annual appropriation equivalent to 31 per cent of population served would be about right. But it has been found difficult to get more than a fourth of the amount needed for running the library, to say nothing of extensions and improvements."

The answer, according to Mr. McCullough, rests with the libraries themselves.

"A library responsive to the public's needs," he continued, "will merit and secure the public's support, and once this is obtained, the problem of getting an adequate maintenance appropriation is much simplified."

Dr. A. E. Postwick of St. Louis, president of the American Library association and librarian in St. Louis, told the meeting that "The Library of the Future" would respond to demands of the serious reader and use its funds only to a moderate degree in purchasing "best sellers."

Omaha librarians who attended the regional meeting were Edna Wolff, secretary of the Nebraska Library association; Blanche Hammond, Stella Conley, Katherine Abbott, Bess Anderson, Edith Tobitt and Ula W. Echols of the Omaha public library; Madeline Hill of the Nebraska state library, and May Ingles of the Technical High school library.

**Daylight Train to Kansas City Restored**

The Missouri Pacific's daylight train from Omaha to Kansas City, will be restored Sunday, it was announced yesterday by Tom Godfrey, local passenger agent.

This train leaves Omaha at 1:55 p. m., arriving in Kansas City at 4:20. The same schedule is followed from Kansas City to Omaha.

At the same time the Union branch train to Lincoln will be restored to service, making connections with the 1:55 Omaha train at Union.

The Falls City local, which has been leaving Omaha at 2:15, will go back to its old schedule Sunday and will leave the Webster street station at 2 p. m.

The 1:55 train to Kansas City and the Union train were taken off last summer owing to the coal shortage and the departure time of the Falls City local set back an hour and 15 minutes. The reinstatement order restores the service as it existed before the emergency.

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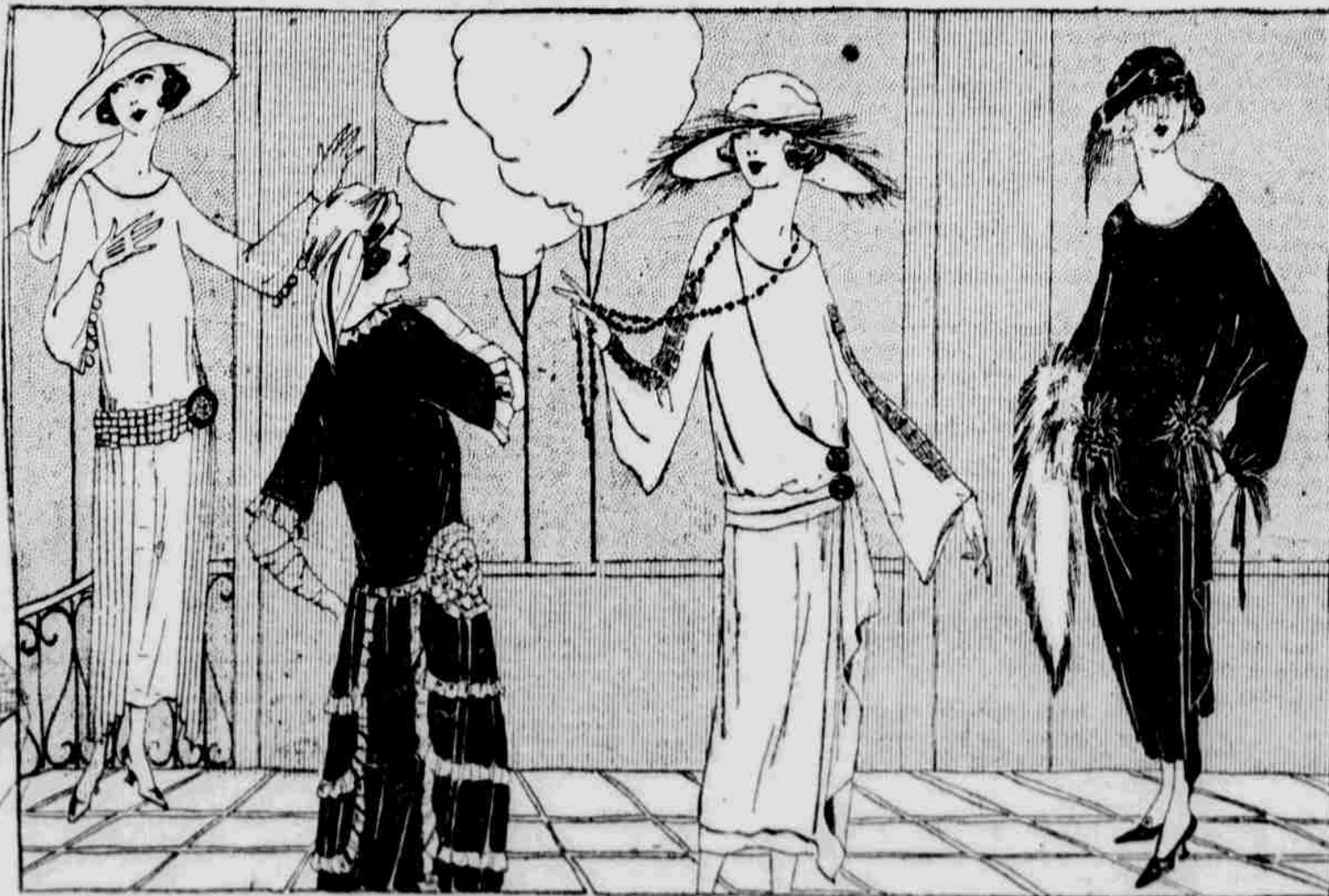
