

Three Die as Fast Train Hops Rails and Is Burned Up

Locomotive and Seven Cars Plunge 70 Feet Into Woods; Two Coaches Intact.

Williamsport, Ind., Oct. 20.—Belief was expressed today that the removal of a rail caused the wreck of Wabash eastbound passenger train No. 2.

The belief was expressed by Conductor Frank W. Hulbert of Detroit and a number of passengers.

The conductor said the rail was not removed from its place, but the spikes had been loosened. Some one who knew the operation of railway signals must have tampered with the rail, according to Hulbert, as the wiring was left in its place so as not to disturb the signals. Passengers said they believed some one had removed the spikes.

The death list: Engineer Charles L. Smuggee, Detroit, Ill. H. W. Martin, express messenger, Detroit. J. A. Smith, baggage man, Detroit. The train was traveling at a rapid rate of speed when the accident occurred. The engine and seven cars left the rails and plunged 70 feet into a woods, turning over several times. Two passenger coaches remained on the rails.

Fire immediately broke out in the mass of wreckage, under which Engineer Smuggee was buried. It was several hours before rescue workers were able to remove his body.

"Democrats Cause Deflation. "This step was in the form of an increase in the discount rate in member banks. At that time, the federal reserve board consisted of six democrats and one republican. Shortly after the first of the year 1920, the only republican on the federal reserve board resigned and the board became solidly democratic through an appointment by President Wilson. In the following April and May, the next step in deflation was taken when the lid was put on insofar as loans were concerned. These acts resulted in a reduction of the loans of the federal reserve system from \$2,250,000,000 to \$1,600,000,000 and bankrupting of hundreds of thousands of merchants and farmers throughout the country. This was done by a Wilson federal reserve board under the Wilson administration.

Senator Owen, democrat from Oklahoma, attests this fact in a letter dated November 16, 1920, to M. L. Riggs of 120 Broadway, New York, which runs in part as follows: "In the great central banks of America, and the federal reserve banks have been deflating credits for the last 12 months. It has resulted in deflating the credit of the United States and impairing the market price of government bonds, crushing price of many sound securities and bringing some commodities like wool down to a price below the possible cost of production."

Seven Men Killed by Explosion in Oklahoma Mine

Gas Believed Cause of Blast in Shaft Near McCurtain, Two Bodies Are Recovered.

McCurtain, Okl., Oct. 20.—Seven men were killed; one is missing, and four were badly injured in an explosion of gas in the Progressive Coal company's mine a mile and a half north of McCurtain this morning.

The dead: Bill Taylor, Irving, Clarence Greenwald, Walter Brascher, Bob Edwards, John Sanders, Everett Seaton. The missing: Burt Sprouse. The injured: Bob Wallace, Roy Edgewell, Claude Everett, Joe Coppenger. The injured were badly burned. Physicians say they are in a serious condition.

At 2:30 this afternoon Sprouse had not been found. Rescuers said they were positive that he had lost his life and that he had been buried under the debris. They reported making slow progress toward the point where they believe Sprouse's body will be found.

The bodies of two dead and the four rescued were brought to the surface at 10, two hours after the explosion. General Manager Seaton of the mine, stated that seven other miners still were entombed. Reports from the mine stated that the men rescued are not believed to be fatally injured.

The United States bureau of mines rescue car was summoned from McAlester. Company officials say they believe gas caused the explosion.

Farmers Grain Company Awarded \$17,400 on Bond

Lincoln, Oct. 20.—(Special)—The supreme court has affirmed the judgment secured by the Farmers' Union Grain company of Omaha for \$17,400 against the United States Fidelity & Guaranty company. The company gave bond for C. K. Borin, manager, who it was alleged had disappeared, leaving a shortage of \$41,000. The company defended on the ground that certain warranties had been violated and that Borin had not signed the bond. The court says the provisions cited could not be called warranties, but representations, and that the company made no requirement that Borin sign the bond before it became liable.

Inheritance Tax on Land Based on Value at Death

Lincoln, Oct. 20.—(Special)—The supreme court has handed down what it says, in its opinion, is a most important ruling with respect to the application of the state inheritance tax law. I reversed the case of the county of York against the estate of Edward Woodley, wealthy landowner, and said that the proper basis for valuing property to determine the amount of the inheritance tax is to find out the amount of cash money that the land could be sold for at the time of the decedent's death.
