

Negro Chemist Performs Strange Laboratory Feats

Graduate of Iowa State College Astounds Associates With Odd Chemical Transformations.

AMES, Ia., Oct. 20.—Given a sweet potato and a laboratory beaker, or a peanut and a test tube, George Washington Carver, a negro born in slavery, and now head of the agricultural department of Tuskegee institute, and a graduate of Iowa state college, will produce anything from rubber to nitroglycerin.

Carver, whose feats in agricultural chemistry have won him a wide recognition in the United States, received both his bachelor and master's degrees here over 20 years ago, and is the only negro in the country who has been regularly asked to address bodies of white men below the Mason-Dixon line on scientific subjects.

Can Do Almost Anything.
People of the south have come to believe that Carver can do almost anything, and while he used to be laughed at when he said he could make roscaroni from a sweet potato, or lard from a peanut, now they are coming to believe that by scratching his hinky head he can produce something from nothing.

Carver has proven the value of peanut hay as a stock feed. He has produced axle grease, salad oil, nitroglycerin, pomade, ink, stains, dyes, quinine and Worcester sauce from the peanut. The sweet potato in his laboratory has been metamorphosed into flour, shoe blacking, library paste, vinegar, ink, chocolate compound, bouque powder, dyes, rubber, caposon, caramel, ginger and tooth emulsion. Not of these distinctly southern crops has he made profitable for farmers to grow by increasing the byproduct possibilities of each.

Like Inspired Fiction.
The aged negro's story reads like a piece of inspired fiction. Born in slavery near Diamond Grove, Mo., his mother stolen by the Ku Klux Klan when he was a child, he weathered years of hardship in an unrelenting quest for an education. His first effort was from a Webster's spelling book. Internationally working and going to school he finished high school in Kansas. He had a natural bent for art, and music. These subjects he took up at Simpson college, and earned such a name for himself that James Wilson said of him: "Professor Carver is probably the very finest painter in Iowa."

Enroll called to Tuskegee by Booker T. Washington in 1892, Carver was a member of the faculty of Iowa state, in charge of the greenhouse, bacteriological laboratory and work in scientific botany.
