## Women to Decide Fall Elections

"The women of 35 will decide the autumn elections, and politicians must reckon with her," recently said Maud Wood Park, president of the National League of Women Voters, who will be in Nebraska next month.

"Men voters have usually begun their political activities at one-and-twenty, taking their political convictions from their fathers at an age when enthusiasm is stronger than judgment. The women who are now coming into politics are for the most part women of mature years. They have grown up looking on an audience. One-and-twenty is content to cheer and keeps up the habit once it is formed. Women want to understand what it's all about; they want to know what they are doing when they select a party or a candidate."

Mrs. Park will be at Hastings, Neb., November 16-17, for the state convention of the league. Mrs. C. G. Ryan of Grand Island is president and Mrs. C. H. Dietrich of Hastings, director of the sixth region of the national body.

Native of Boston is Mrs. Park, graduate of Radcliffe college, organizer of the Boston Parent-Teachers' association and past president of the College Equal Suffrage league.

Mrs. Park gained her first national prominence when she was president of the College Equal Suffrage league she crossed the continent four times, speaking on woman suffrage at large colleges and state universities. Under her generalship as congressional chairman of the National American Woman Suffrage association was conducted the first two years' intensive campaign in Washington for the passage of the federal suffrage amendment. Many congressmen attribute their conversion to the principle of woman suffrage to the dignified, thorough and unflinching way in which Mrs. Park followed the course of the amendment, in its perilous journey through congress.
