

One quart cranberries, two cups boiling water, 152 to 2 cups sugar. Bost sugar and water together for five

minutes; skim; add the cranberries and boil without sturing (five minutes is usually sufficient) until all the skins are broken. Remove from the fire when the popping stops.

### Strained Cranberry Sauce

If a strained sauce is preferred, cook the cranberries and water, then press through the strainer, seeping back the skins; add the sugar and finish the cooking as suggested.

Cook cranberries in porcelain-lined, enameled, or aluminum vessels - never in tin.
