AMERICA—IN 2000 A. D.

In an era when most countries are paying some attention to the quality of the racial stock, when Germany, France, Great Britain, Norway, Sweden, Australia, New Zealand, and even Japan are either interdicting immigration altogether or else strictly limiting it, or, at least, are seriously studying the problems of demography—the question as to what our country intends doing in the line of immigration is of great interest. It is true that for a term of years immigration is to be greatly restricted. This postpones the question somewhat. What will be the basis of selection when it is next taken up? How much will eugenic considerations be weighed as compared with the urge of labor, of capital, or of different racial groups? Raymond Pearl of Johns Hopkins has given very serious study to the question. Some of his conclusions are as follows: We are already well beyond our period of most rapid growth of population.
