Committee Probes State Hotel Muddle

Lincoln, Oct. 27.—(Special)—The committee that has shouldered the task of bringing order out of the chaos of the Nebraska Building and Investment company, owner of the Nebraska Hotel company, which operated hotels at a number of Nebraska towns, including the Fontenelle at Omaha and the Lincoln at Lincoln, has begun its sittings. It consists of Clarence E. Harson, representing the common stockholders, who have all voting power; Lindley Hurst, representing the preferred stockholders; and Judge W. E. Dorsey, chosen by these two.

The sittings are in secret. So far nobody has been called into consultation except the half dozen attorneys for the various litigants, and they merely turned over what information they had. The committee named Mr. Dorsey as chairman. He says that the diversity of interests makes the job a difficult one, but that the committee hopes to make recommendations that will be acceptable and which will end the expensive litigation now in the courts since the receivership was overturned.

Admiral Rodman Would Take Navy Out of Politics

Des Moines, Oct. 27.—The United States "owes its independence and commanding position in the world's affairs largely to the achievements of its navy," Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman, who commanded the American battleship force with the British grand fleet in the world war, declared in a "navy day" address here today. He urged his hearers, "as patriotic citizens," to instruct their congressmen "to give us a 100 per cent navy, so

that the navy will be ready to act instantly, and your money will not be wasted.

"It is a pity," he declared, "that politics—I mean party politics—have such an important bearing on this subject, that not infrequently, our fighting forces are made to suffer on this account. If we had more statesmen in congress and fewer local politicians, our country, and indirectly, our navy, would be greatly benefited.

"Are we going to cut our congressional appropriations?" he asked, "so that the navy is ruined; so that we will continue to spend thousands of dollars every year for a navy not quite big enough?"

By the terms of limitation of armament treaty, Admiral Rodman asserted, "the policy of our country in reference to the strength of our navy, is definitely established for a period of 10 years, and it follows logically, that the necessity for such a force is imperative. . . . If we would live strictly up to this new naval treaty, we should build the five plane carriers allowed and sufficient cruisers,

submarines and aircraft, to bring our navy up to the ratio. If we do this, then we will have a navy second to none, and the safety of our commerce on the high sea is assured, and we can look forward to continued prosperity.

Mexican Consulate in New York City Ordered Closed

Washington, Oct. 27.—The Mexican consulate in New York City was ordered closed, it was said today at the Mexican embassy, because of the decision of the New York state supreme court in the Oliver American Trading corporation case, which, it was contended, was in violation of both the principles of civil and of international law. Mexican officials in New York also, it was added, had no facilities with which to carry on their duties, inasmuch as the funds and furniture of the consulate had been attached.

For these reasons, it was stated, the consulate would remain closed until the questions at issue had been satisfactorily adjusted.

Mexican officials here said they had asked authorities of the Department of State to take action, but comment there was withheld. It was learned there, however, that the matter had been taken up directly with New York state officials by the department. Until a reply is received from Governor Miller it is understood that the State Department will make no reply to the Mexican representatives.

Commenting on the case Manuel C. Tellez, charge d'affaires of Mexico, said that the action of the New York court was in violation of the immunity extended to the consular representatives all over the world.

As explained by the Mexican embassy, the Oliver American Trading corporation case had its origin in a contract entered into by the Mexican government with that company two years ago, granting them certain privileges to operate their own rolling stock on Mexican lines and permitting to collect 50 per cent increased rates. At the termination of the contract, the company was notified to pay the right-of-way duty established for all cars running on Mexican lines, and in default of payment the government placed an embargo on the rolling stock. Embassy officials maintained that according to Mexican laws, if any action was to be taken it should have been before Mexican tribunals.
